TALES OF BUTCHERV **Bulgarians Guilty of Barbarities** Slay Defenceless People

and Leave Trail of Desolation

Conflicting Reports About Results of Battles But General **Opinion** is That Bulgars Have Met with Crushind Defeats-Turkey Proposes to Occupy Lost Territory.

London, July 9-Out of the welter of onflicting stories from the Balkans it is npossible to sift the truth. This was markedly illustrated tonight, a despatch m the Daily Telegraph's correspondnt at Uskup, dated Tuesday night, reorting that there had been hardly any ighting in the last few days, while Belgrade despatches received reported further Servian victories, the latest advices from the Servian capital asserting that all the Bulgarians who had invaded Servia had been driven back across the frontier. There seems to be little doubt that

General Ivanoff's army is steadily re-tiring before the victorious Greeks, and it is reported that the Bulgarians have evacuated both Kavala, where the Greek fleet is operating, and Dedeagatch.

Whether there is any truth in the Vienna reports to the effect that Bul-garia has applied to the powers to ar-range peace, is not known, but it would appear not unlikely, since clearly things are not going well with the Bulgarians, and the outbreak of cholera at many points in the field of operations, com-bined with the exhaustion of the armies points in the field of operations, com-bined with the exhaustion of the armies by the fierceness of the struggle, is cal-culated to render some such solution welcome to the combatants. This is especially so because of the uncertainty of the policy of Roumania, which is now reported to be equally ready to at tack either Servis or Bulgaria as the occasion may demand in order to pre-vent a disturbance of the Balkan equi-librium.
