

## BURGLARIES CAUSE ALARM CASH AND SHOES ARE STOLEN

W. Newman, Hamilton Road, Robbed of \$70—Thieves Take Shoes Valued at \$80 From Modern Shoe Store—Police Have Renewed Their Activities.

Two daring burglaries, one in east and the other in South London, Wednesday night have alarmed residents of both those districts, and have called forth renewed activities on the part of the police. Seventy dollars in cash was taken from the store of W. Newman, grocer, 482 Hamilton road, some time between 7 and 10 o'clock in the evening. Shoes valued at more than \$80 were taken from the South London branch of the Modern Shoe Repair, Worthy road and Bruce street, either in the afternoon or evening. The store was closed for the usual half-holiday at 1 o'clock.

## WOULD ADVISE GOVT. REGARDING TARIFF

Vice-President of C. M. A. Discusses Situation With Businessmen.

ST. THOMAS, March 3.—That parliament may be advised on the tariff situation and what changes ought to be made in the list was advocated this afternoon by John R. Shaw, vice-president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, at luncheon tendered the visiting manufacturers on their stop-over call today. That 1,700 labor unions of Canada had passed resolutions in behalf of the formation of a commission, said Mr. Shaw, and gave it to Senator Gideon Robertson half a year ago, endorsing the view of the association. But why parliament had not seen fit to carry out the dictum of the manufacturers Mr. Shaw was at a loss to tell unless it was that the Government was afraid.

## GREAT OUTCRY RISES IN SHIPPING WORLD AGAINST THIEVING

LONDON, March 4.—A great outcry has arisen in the shipping world over the heavy losses that are incurred through the depredations of thieves, many of whom it is suspected are in the employ of the companies that are the victims. Lord Askwith states it has been estimated that in transport through the port of London alone, through pilfering in various forms, there is a loss of £3,500,000 a year.
