REMARKS.—The gentlemen in charge of the Hudson Bay Company's posts, on the north of the Columbia, have made very accurate estimates of the Indian population in the neighbourhood of their several stations, and we have every reason to believe, from our own observations, in the accuracy of these statements.

The Indian tribes on the Columbia and the interior of the country are a very migratory race, and it is very difficult to arrive at their exact numbers. We believe the above statements to be rather under their numerical strength.

We shall have the honour to submit in our Return in 1846 more detailed statements of all the separate tribes.

EXTRACT of a REPORT from Lieutenant *Vavasour* to Colonel *Holloway*, dated 1 March 1846.

FORT VICTORIA is situated on the southern end of Vancouver's Island, in the small harbour of Cammusan, the entrance to which is rather intricate. The fort is a square inclosure of 100 yards, surrounded by cedar pickets, 20 feet in height, having two octagonal bastions, containing each six 6-pounder iron guns at the north-east and south-west angles; the buildings are made of squared timber, eight in number, forming three sides of an oblong. This fort has lately been established;
