THE ROLE OF THE NATIVE ADVISOR

The position of Native Student Advisor was established to provide counselling and other support services to Native Students in post-secondary programs enrolled at St. Thomas University and the University of New Brunswick. Some of the responsibilities include:

1. Visiting reserves and preparing potential students.

Participating in student orientation.

I assist with the registration process, with course selection and making the required arrangements with the Department of Indian Affairs.

3. Conducting individual "outreach" interviews.

I actively meet with students outside my office making one-on-one contact to learn of their needs and to inform them of the services and resources that are available in the university community, e.g., Library, Counselling Services and Health Services etc.

4. Assisting students with career development.

A major resource which Counselling Services provides is a Career Information Library. This library contains information on post-secondary educational institutions across Canada, career descriptions, resume writing, job search techniques, native issues, etc.

5. Helping with writing and study skills.

Time management, study habits, essay writing and reading hints are areas I have worked on with students. I also make active referrals for students who need additional help to the Writing Lal, Extension Services, UNB.

Provide personal counselling.
