Dear Sir Hamar Greenwood:

I have now had time to read the address which you delivered on the Overseas Empire and Foreign Affairs, as printed in "United Empire". With the view expressed in this article I am in full agreement. I think you have correctly measured the present position which the Empire in its constitutional evolution has reached. It has been my judgment for some time that it will be necessary for some years to lapse before anything further of a substantial nature ~~could~~ be done in the way of inter-Empire organisation for the management of our foreign affairs. There is more danger in too rapid progress than in too slow progress.

I congratulate you most heartily on your return to the House of Commons in support of Mr. Baldwin after a comparatively long career in high position in the other party. Were it possible for me to consider or to think of achieving entrance to British politics I would most undoubtedly do so on
