The memory of their brave and unselfish deeds can never die. Fain would their Alma Mater raise a monument to perpetuate their fame and more especially to preserve for future generations the story of those who gave their lives. But for this she is dependent on others. She has, unfortunately, no funds for such a purpose. The hope is fondly cherished that some day a memorial hall or other imposing form of remembrance will stand on the University grounds. Every other university in Canada will have its memorial. McGill, with its splendid record, cannot afford to be a conspicuous exception. Many buildings belonging to privately endowed universities, like McGill, are of a memorial character, some erected by the parents of a deceased son and some by graduates or other groups. No such building stands on the McGill campus. Here is a notable opportunity for some individual, or set of individuals, to set a worthy example. Who will be the first? Whilst the campaign for funds soon to be undertaken will be more particularly for general endowment purposes, subscriptions for special objects, such as a memorial Convocation Hall, will also be gladly welcomed.

### **The Universities Companies**

In the first year of the existence of the McGill Regiment (the first year of the war) the organization of a full McGill battalion for active service was at one time put forth as a serious proposition, but wiser counsels prevailed. Had the attempt been made to
