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resources, and for the inauguration of a new enterprise, which shall leave its impress upon our history and upon the world; and when by voices within, and by appeals from without,—when by the workings of the Spirit, and by the openings of Providence,—when by the command of God, and by the entreaty of precious souls,—when by the inspiriting example of the Church in other lands, and by the mysterious and overwhelming sacrifice of Christ,—we are summoned to immediate action, impelled onward in the path of duty,—O, is there one amongst us who does not feel the enkindling flame of love divine, and who is not ready to make some sacrifice, to give some money, to perform some service, by which the Church may be honoured in its missionary career, and by which the Redeemer may see of the travail of his soul, and be satisfied?

With this view, I have written this appeal. It is but an impersect contribution to a glorious cause. If I have dropped any unguarded word, or revealed any improper spirit, I must ask to be forgiven; and in this, as in all other movements, I am sure we shall every one pray that God who did teach the hearts of His faithful people by sending to them the light of His Holy Spirit, would "grant us by the same Spirit to have a right judgment in all things, and ever more to rejoice in His

holy comfort, through the merits of Christ Jesus our Saviour.'
