BOMBARDING ODESSA

Kniaz Potemkine, Using Full Charges, Opens Fire on City.

Second Mutinous Warship Reported at Cape Fountain, Ten Miles From Odessa—Rebels Fired Several Shots at Cosacks in the Suburb of Langeron—Relief Fleet Leaves Sebastopol—Czar Proclaims Martial Law.

London, June 30.—The Daily Mail this morning prints the following from its Odessa correspondents, received at 10.45 o'clock Thursday night.

"Using full charges, the Kniaz Potemkine opened fire on the city to-night.

Large bodies of troops have arrived at Sebastopol, but there are altogether 15,000 troops in Odessa."

Another Report.

London, June 30.—The Odessa correspondent of The Daily Telegraph in a despatch filed at 11.30 o'clock Thursday night says that the Kniaz Potemkine is firing on the town, and that Admiral Kruger's squadron is not in sight.

Burn a Steamer.

London, June 30.—The Daily Express prints the despatch from Odessa: "The second mutinous warship is reported at Cape Fountain, ten miles from here. A transport with Russians from Port Arthur and a Russian steamer were held up by the Kniaz Potemkine at 7 o'clock and compelled to lie up under her guns for two hours."

"At 9 o'clock the rebels fired several shots at the suburb of Langeron, where there is a detachment of Cosacks. She then swung round until her guns pointed to the centre of Odessa and fired a black cartridge."

"A steamer which the Kniaz Potemkine stopped was seen to burst into flames."

Fleet Just Started.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—A despatch which arrived here early this morning from Sebastopol announced that a squadron of battleships, the Tri Sviatitella, Sinope and Rebetislav, with a cruiser and a torpedo boat, only started for Odessa at 1 o'clock last evening.

This explains the non-appearance of the squadron at Odessa; but it is difficult to conjecture the reasons for delaying departure two days at such a critical juncture.

Killed 22 Officers.

London, June 30.—The Odessa correspondent of The Daily Mail sends the following: "Intermittent firing has been going on all day long. Artillery has arrived and is in hiding. The battleship landed fifteen men to attend the funeral of the sailor Onitshuk and threatened to bombard the town if any of them were arrested."

The mutineers liberated nine officers, but killed twenty two.

The port is an absolute ruin from Piatovak's shells to the Russian Steamship Co's docks.

People are only allowed in the proximity of the harbor by the guards when furnished with written permission from the commanding general.

A telegram from Sebastopol says that the Kniaz Potemkine has only ammunition for 300 shells.

Czar Proclaims Martial Law.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—The Emperor has issued the following decree addressed to the ruling senate: "In order to guarantee public safety and to terminate the disorders at Odessa and neighboring localities we have found it necessary to declare a state of war in Odessa and district, and so invest the commander of the troops in the military district of Odessa with the rights of military authority and special rights of civil administration for the defence of order and public tranquillity."

Onitshuk's Funeral.

Odessa, June 30.—A semblance of order has been restored here, but the situation is still critical. The central railway station was destroyed by fire last night, many persons being injured. The funeral of Onitshuk, which has just been held, became an imposing popular demonstration, but without disorder. A great procession, headed by priests, followed the body to military cemetery. The coffin, covered with the St. Andrew's flag, and with numerous wreaths, was carried by eight sailors. The population is still in a very nervous mood. A bomb exploded last night in a private house, and several persons were injured.

1,000 Parsons Killed.

Sensational accounts are current regarding Wednesday night's rioting. In the accounts it is stated that a thousand persons were killed. The troops faced a condition of complete anarchy, thousands of desperate incendiaries trying to set fire to every building. They adapted the sternest measures and employed machine guns against the mob.

Slaughter Again.

At 3 a. m. yesterday a large body of rioters tried to enter the central part of the town, and a terrific fusillade was kept up by both sides. It is alleged that hundreds were killed, and that when the mob tried to ascend the steps of the Church of St. Nicholas to reach the boulevard St. Nicholas troops fired repeated volleys into the crowd with terrible results, wagon loads of dead being carried away.

It is stated that three police officers, ten policemen, two or three Cosacks and ten infantry soldiers were killed in these encounters.

Transport Crew Mutinies.

The crew of a Government transport, which arrived here yesterday from Nikoloff, mutinied, seized their officers and joined the crew of the battleship Kniaz Potemkine to whom they turned over the captain and other officers of the transport. It is reported that the foreign Consuls have applied to their respective Governments to send warships to Odessa.

Mutiny at Libau.

Libau, Russia, June 30.—The Russian sailors here mutinied Wednesday night, attacked the Government stores, seized the arms and fired into the officers' quarters. Infantry and Cosacks were brought up to stop the fighting, but the mutineers here. Libau is a Russian port.

BOILER EXPLODES

Green River Basket Factory Demolished—Two Men Escape.

Green River, Que., June 29.—The boiler in Joseph Dote's large basket factory was blown up just after dinner yesterday. The boiler was thrown fully 100 feet to the west, the head being sent about 100 yards over buildings in the opposite direction. The factory was badly wrecked, a great portion of the side and roof being blown out.

Dote and his son, who attend the engine, were standing not more than ten feet from one side of it when the accident occurred and both escaped uninjured. Thousands of berry baskets were scattered in all directions.

A BLOW AT BRITISH TRADE.

Province of Quebec's Tax on Commercial Travellers.

London, June 30.—(C. A. P.)—The Evening Globe says: "We have commented on the favor shown by the Ottawa Parliament to foreign emigrants, but the Quebec Legislature has gone much further in demonstrating the weakening friendship by imposing an annual tax of \$60 per head on commercial travellers employed by firms having no place of business in the Dominion. It strikes in the direction of a heavy blow at British trade, as the number of British commercial travellers is by far the largest."

Dominion Day Menors.

London, June 30.—(C. A. P.)—Among the list of honors for the King's birthday are: To be companion of the order of St. Michael and St. George, George J. W. Robertson, commissioner of agriculture in Canada; to be ordinary member of the military division, Gen. Laurie; the imperial service order, to be companions, Laurence Perissone, of the Northwest mounted police; Lieut. Col. Jarvis of the department of agriculture and Arthur Newbury clerk to the executive council of P.E.I.

Unknown Boy Drowned.

Samia, June 30.—The body of an unknown boy, who was drowned in the St. Clair River, last Thursday night, was recovered yesterday morning. Hundreds of people have viewed it, but no one has been able to identify it. He was about 15 years old, five feet tall and weighed 130 pounds. He was dressed in overalls.

Forged a Postal Note.

Toronto, June 30.—Inspector Henderson of the postal service went to Hamilton yesterday and arrested W. E. Murray of 33 North John street, who is alleged to have stolen a letter from one Stark and forged his name to a postal note at Carter, Algona. The inspector has been after Murray for some time.

Bank Cashier is Guilty.

Halifax, N. S., June 30.—The trial of T. W. Johns, cashier of the Bank of Yarmouth, ended yesterday morning; the jury found him guilty on both counts of the indictment, which was that he had made false returns of the Bank of Yarmouth to the Government, and that these returns were wilfully false.
