

OBITUARY JOHN CAMPBELL

As one after one of the old St. Andrews that the unwritten history of St. Andrews is fast being obliterated. Perhaps no event of recent years has established that truth to a greater degree, than the death of Mr. Beaver Harbor, Charlotte County, on No vember 29.

The late Mr. Campbell was born at St. Andrews, on February 24, 1836, a son o James Campbell and Jane Longmuir, who was of Loyalist descent. At the time of his death, Mr. Campbell was probably the oldest graduate from the Charlotte County Grammar School, with the one exception of Mr. George Mowatt, who is still living at Beach Hill Farm.
