Passengers Witness For Murder of 12-Year Thrilling Suicide

Two Big Ships Arrive in Halifax

HALIPAX, N. S. April 5.—Battered by furious gales all the way across the Atlantic and with her decks continu-ally swept by mountainous seas, the Allan liner Virginian, Capt. Vipond, from Liverpool, March 27, arrived here today with the British mails and 1,500 sengers, mostly British immigrants. going to points in the Canadian west. The steamer sustained some deck-damage, and all the passengers, who had been ill, were a happy lot when the steamer tied up at the pier. On March 30 the Virginian passed the Dominion line steamer Dominion, bound to Halifax with 1,300 Salvation Army immigrants and on Friday she was in wireless communication with the Cunard liner Lucania, bound to New York. The latter steamer reported having encountered terrific weather.

On the same day the Virginian spoke a French steamer showing the letters "J. N. L. C.," in lat 45.45, lon. 30.30, bound west. The steamer asked to be reported to the Associated Press "All

The Hamburg-American liner Pretoria, Captain Schrtter, from Hamburg March 15, and Boulogne March 21, bound for New York, arrived here today short of coal. The steamer met terrific weather, the gales being unusually heavy and the seas high, the decks being swept, but no serious damage done. At no time could she make over 250 miles a day. On the first day out from Hamburg the passengers on deck witnessed a thrilling scene, when a young German girl dashed from the second cabin to the deck and then to the rail, and before any person could catch her she plunged into the sea. The liner was stopped and a boat lowered, but long before it reached the struggling girl she disappeared beneath the waves. The liner's bunkers were almost empty when she reached port. She anchored at quarantine, where she transferred to a tug 100 of her 1,650 passengers, who are bound to points in Canada. In the hold of the Pretoria there is a huge menagerie, there being lions, tigers, a jaguar, monkeys and over 1,000 birds. # TWO NEGROES INTO THE SEA WERE LYNGHED

Old White Boy

Battered by Furious Gales And Attack on Young Woman -Hundreds Were in the Mob

> WESSON, Miss., April 5.-John Burr young negro, was lynched here today by about 500 men, for the murde of a 17-year-old white boy.
>
> Last night according to Burr's confession and the account of an eye-witness, he was fishing in a mill pond when Earl Smith the 12 year old son of J. W. Smith, a planter, approached him and began a conversation. Burr was an employe of Smith's father, and he said to the boy:

"Look up. Look at the bird." As young Smith gazed skyward the negro shot him in the back of the head with a shotgun. Burr threw the boy's body into the mill pond and fled, but he was captured by offcers and was on his way to jail, and just as the Sabbath dawned a party of about thirty took the prisoner away from the officers. The negro was quickly hanged from a tree and several shots were fired to hasten his death.

MOBILE, Ala., April 5.-Walter Clayton, a negro, who was serving time at the stockade of the Hand Lumber Company for manslaughter, late Saturday afternoon, criminally assaulted Mrs. Jeseph White, aged 20 years, and was lynched by a mob of men outside the limits of Bay Minette last night.




