UNION STOCK YARDS. TORONTO, June 17.—Receipts of live stock at the Union Yards were 211 cars, 3792 cattle, 1029 hogs, 630 sheep and lambs and 422 calves.

Swift & Co. Exporters. Choice steers of Chicago bought 300 export steers at \$6.80 to \$7.15, and Lunnes and Halligan got 36 selected steers, 1340 lbs. each, at \$7.40. This made a total of 336 export cattle.

Butchers. Judgment Reserved.

OTTAWA, June 18.—The Railway Commission yesterday afternoon reserved judgment on the average and reciprocal demurrage cases which have been in progress since Monday. The International Harvester Co. opposed reciprocal and supported average demurrage on the ground that the former was impracticable. J. E. Walsh presented letters from a number of large eastern Canadian industrial firms and United States authorities declaring for average demurrage and E. W. Besty letters from the Canadian Freight Association on western lines opposing any such plan.

Grabbed Live Wire.

TORONTO, June 18.—W. J. Linstner, aged 25, 260 Carlton street, was instantly killed yesterday at the rear of 49 Dundas street, when in climbing to the roof of the building, he grasped a live wire. The man had formed a short circuit by placing one hand on the wire and the other on the eaves-trough.

Linstner was employed by the Toronto Butcher Supply Co., at the Dundas street address, and went to the back of the building to raise some ventilators. An inquest will be opened at the morgue to-night.

Maj. Hughes Seriously Hurt. KINGSTON, June 18.—Maj. H. T. Hughes of the Royal Canadian Engineers, was thrown from his horse at Barriefield camp and was seriously injured.

Sir Ian Hamilton, Col. Sam Hughes and Maj.-Gen. Cotton arrived in the city last night. They will inspect the Barriefield camp and attend the closing at Royal Military College, this afternoon.

RULERS VISIT THE KAISER

Sovereigns of Federated German States Present Felicitations.

Second Day of Emperor Wilhelm's "Silver" Jubilee as a Monarch is Given Up to the Visit of Princes of Various Principalities — Kaiser Lauded as Patron of Every Moral, Noble and Beautiful Impulse.

BERLIN, June 18.—"The day of the people" Monday, in the celebration of the completion of 25 years' reign by Emperor William, was succeeded yesterday by that of the allied sovereigns of the federated states of the empire, who, including the mayors of the three city republics—Hamburg, Bremen and Lubeck—presented their congratulations to their colleagues and leader at the castle.

Most of the rulers arrived in Berlin Monday night or yesterday morning, and gave the sons of the Emperor a busy session in receiving them at the various stations. They gathered at noon in the Pillar Hall of the castle and last night were present at a state banquet presided over by the Emperor.

The Pillar Hall is not in that part of the castle ordinarily used for state functions. It is situated in the portion devoted to the private apartments of the imperial family, and was chosen to enable the Empress Augusta Victoria, who is indisposed, to participate with the Emperor in the reception of the German rulers.

The Prince Regent of Bavaria, acting as spokesman, said the Emperor, as director of the foreign policy of the German Empire, had shown himself to be an upholder of peace and at the same time an upholder of the empire's might, which was the safest guarantee of honorable peace. He praised him as the creator by his personal initiative of the German navy.

The prince regent then spoke of the economic progress made during the 25 years' reign of the Emperor over Germany, and praised his majesty as the patron of every moral, noble and beautiful impulse in the empire.

The Emperor was then presented by the prince regent with a table centrepiece in the shape of a ship. The Emperor thanked his colleagues for their steady support during his reign. He emphasized among the other elements of progress the attention devoted to sport and the cultivation of the ideal of "a sound mind in a sound body."

SPANKING CAUSED BIG FIRE.

And the Question Now is "Did the Kid Get Let Off?" MONTICELLO, N.Y., June 18.—Mrs. B. Wolfe of Ferrisale, Sullivan County, near here, tried to spank her young son Monday night and in doing so upset an oil stove. In the process the young business houses and three dwellings, including the Wolfe house, were destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$75,000.

The buildings were all of wooden construction and the flames spread so rapidly that nearly all of the business section was wiped out.

Phone Thieves Sentenced.

TORONTO, June 18.—An indefinite term at the Industrial School was the sentence handed out yesterday to the two 16-year-old lads convicted of robbing telephone booths, of over \$800, and also for attempting to rob a young lady of a grip containing pay rolls to the value of \$2,000. The man who is said to be the real promoter of the robberies, has not yet been apprehended.

Bricklayer Crushed To Death.

STAFFORD, June 18.—When the vault door at the Bank of Commerce fell over on him, Windham Harding, bricklayer, was so terribly crushed, that he died at the hospital, two hours later.

(Continued from Page 1) Receipts Slightly Decreased. To-night the Synod discussed the report of the Executive Committee. This report showed total receipts for regular diocesan purposes of \$13,669, a decrease of \$37. The receipts for other than diocesan objects were \$19,578, a decrease of \$812.

The Synod now holds in trust a capital sum of \$877,344, a net increase during the year of \$45,882. The income has been sufficient to pay six per cent. on capital to all beneficiaries, and there remains a surplus of \$1,387.

Rev. Canon Hicks, as clerical delegate, and Mr. John Ranford of Clinton, as lay delegate, were re-elected.

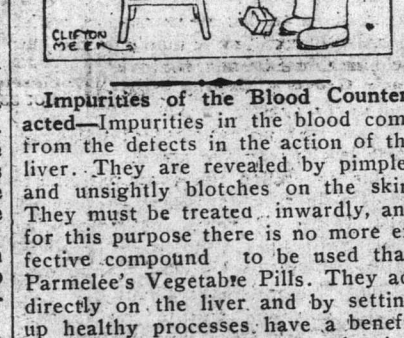

To Remove Mildew.

Mildew is very difficult to remove. One method is to rub the spots with lemon-juice and then with salt. Another is to wet them with warm water, rub on a little soap, and sprinkle with powdered French chalk and salt. Dry in the sun and repeat the treatment if necessary. If these methods fail bleaching water can be resorted to. A simple bleaching water is made by boiling a tablespoonful of borax in a quart of water.
