COMMANDER EVANS CORDIALLY GREETED

Great Audience Packs Carnegie Hall to Hear Him Tell of Expedition.

North Pole Discoverer Regrets Lack of American Explorers—Splendid Pictures of Antarctic.)

(New York Times, March 18.) Commander Edward Radcliffe Garth Russell Evans, R. N., the second in command of the Capt. Robert F. Scott expedition to the south pole, told the story of that tragic journey to a great audience in Carnegie Hall last night.

The boyish-looking British naval officer gave a deeply stirring recital of the terrible hardships suffered on the trip and the magnificent heroism displayed.

When following a glowing tribute to Capt. Scott, Rear Admiral Peary, the discoverer of the north pole, pointed to Commander Evans and introduced him as a sailor worthy of the best traditions of a British seaman.

The American spoke with deep feeling, especially when he made reference to Scott, his friend, and to Lady Scott the widow, whom Peary had met in New York when she was hurrying across the continent to catch a New Zealand bound steamer, expecting to meet her husband on his return from the pole.

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"But the ranks of that band of splendid arctic veterans is rapidly thinning, and in its place is growing such a company of peerless arctic explorers as no other country has—Scott, Shackleton, Mawson and Evans."

"We are here tonight to listen to a story of the arctic regions, one of the greatest of modern epics."

"The story which Capt. Evans will tell us has much more than a passing interest for me, Capt. Scott was my friend for years. I was in London and on his ship when he sailed, nearly four years ago. I met Lady Scott here in New York on her way to meet her husband two weeks before the news of the catastrophe came."

In 1808 for the first time man set foot on a brief instant on the antarctic continent. In 1809 the first overland sledge journey in the antarctic region was made by Capt. Scott who penetrated the white terra incognita of Antarctica for a distance of 370 miles."
