NEW PRINCIPAL OF NIGHT SCHOOL

Mr. Gee, of Collegiate Technical Staff Receives that Appointment.

A joint meeting of the commercial and industrial committees of the Board of Education was held Monday evening to complete arrangements for the opening of the evening schools on the 11th inst. There were present of the industrial committee Messrs. Lahey, Armstrong, Adams, Brandon, Harris, Powell; of the commercial committee, Messrs. Shepherson, Lane and Steadman. Mr. Gee, principal, and Mr. Burt were also present.

Dr. Pandeno, the provincial organizer and inspector of agricultural classes in the schools of the province, who was visiting this neighborhood, was given an opportunity to present the claims of this work could be introduced without cost to the locality, and that it formed a most useful and attractive part of the science work of the schools. Moreover, it presented to those whose tastes led them to incline that way, an inducement to select some form of agricultural work as their calling and thus helped to correct a too academic trend in our educational system. Various members of the committee expressed hearty concurrence with the views he presented, and gratification at the fact that they had an opportunity to hear him.

It was decided, on a motion by Mr. Clement, seconded by Mr. Armstrong, that Mr. Gee should be appointed principal of the industrial evening classes at a salary of \$4.00 per night.

The question of charging a fee, to defray the expenses of the regulars was decided negatively. The members of the commercial industrial agreed that, according to the rule adopted by the industrial committee, no class should be formed with a minimum of less than 10 pupils at a time for each teacher engaged, and that the fee for the child be discontinued when that minimum fell to 5.

A draft of the proposed syllabus, which is to be issued shortly in the form of a prospectus, was read by Mr. Gee and Mr. Shultis, and adopted. The question of the engagement of teachers for the evening industrial classes was left to the sub-committee of Messrs. Lahey, Adams and Gee. For the commercial classes, it was proposed by Mr. Shultis that he himself should teach book-keeping and commercial arithmetic. Miss Shultis, typewriter, Miss Dickson, senior stenography and Miss Buskard junior stenography. He is instructed to write to the Department of Education to find whether they would sanction this arrangement.

Advertising, in the form of brief notes in the newspaper, calling attention to the classes was authorized. Mr. Lahey requested that as many members of the committees as possible should be at the school on the nights set apart for the registration of pupils, 11th, 12th and 13th inst.

Mr. Powell reintroduced the question of providing a building for vocational work, urging that the time is opportune, since a National Trade and Commerce Convention is shortly to be held at Ottawa, and that industrial education will form an important matter for consideration, and the decisions reached which may include recommendations for Government assistance, will be based upon the reports required of the various sections of the Dominion.
