## THE MARKS OF A TRUE SOLDIER

The world is a cruel world. They have been not one whit behind any other man in advance of many. Their praiseworthy service, at St. Julien, Langemarck, Ypres and in Somme, will never be forgotten. Bravery is a virtue absolutely essential to the soldier.  
But courage is needed not only on the battlefield, it is needed wherever duty is to be done, whether in the home and in business and in social life. How true it is that the fear of man bringeth a snare.  
It always takes courage to do the right in the face of opposition. Be- cause we know something better than smug complacency, something better than self-interest, something better than self-protection, our boys are far from wanting great in the service of the world, and the essence of service is sacrifice.  
The last mark of a true soldier is patriotism.  
What is patriotism? It is something more, infinitely more than flag-waving. It is a passion to uplift. That was the kind of patriotism that characterized the life of Christ and that is the kind we must seek after. He saw his nation's need. He saw the need of the world, and he responded to that call.  
And he is surely no patriot who will see his country bleeding to death and will not rise to help her either by going himself or by making it possible for some one else to go. True patriotism is more than national. It is international. It is something more than racial. It is international. It leaps over all artificial boundaries and takes in the whole world's need. The eyes of Jesus went beyond Palestine, beyond his own people to the peoples of all lands. He would help all and save all. Because Britain had the true patriotic spirit she is where she is today, and we must imitate this in our lives and seek to promote it wherever we can.
