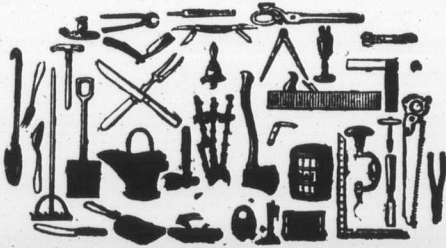

The Village Council met as a court of revision of the assessment roll for 1905 on Monday evening, 29th inst. All present except Mr. Taylor. Councilor Jacob was appointed chairman and the following appeals were disposed of:—

THE BULLIS MILL BURNED

On Friday morning last fire completely destroyed the grist and saw mill of Mr. S. Y. Bullis, situated a half-mile east of Athens. The fire was discovered about 3 a.m., but it had then made such headway that saving anything from the mill was out of the question. When Mr. Bullis and Mr. Stewart, who live near by, were aroused the roof was about ready to fall; all the shoring had been burned away, and the fire roaring through the skeleton of heavy timbers presented a grand and terrible sight.

A messenger came to Athens and gave the alarm, but a large number failed to hear the bell. The engine was run down and did good service in preventing the spread of the fire. Fortunately, a south wind was blowing which carried the clouds of sparks up the creek. Several times fire started in adjoining buildings, but was promptly extinguished. The fringe of trees along the roadway proved an effectual protection to Mr. Bullis' residential property.

The loss will be in the neighborhood of \$15,000, and the insurance \$5,000. The mill was fitted with double boilers and engines and had water-power for part of the season. The machinery for gristing, sawing, cheese box making, etc., was most complete, and a full staff of men were employed on contract and custom work. A large stock of logs lay in the yard, and in the building there was considerable finished stock and goods in process of manufacture. Within the last two years, the mill building had been thoroughly overhauled and covered with a new metal roof. Following the purchase of that mill, Mr. Bullis had moved considerable of the machinery from the Athens mill there, and this also is lost.

This week teams are engaged in drawing logs to the Athens mill, which is being rapidly fitted up for business.

The destroyed mill was erected about sixty years ago by the late Joseph Slack. In 1869 it was purchased by the Saunders family and by them successfully conducted until the death of the late J. B. Saunders, when it passed into the possession of Mr. Bullis. The loss to Mr. Bullis is, of course, heavy, but with characteristic pluck and enterprise he is bravely facing the situation, and in his efforts he has the sympathy and best wishes of a host of friends.

The I. O. F. at Church

The anniversary services of the I. O. F., as is usual in Athens, took the form of attendance at divine service, and in addition to the local members several were present from Delta and other points. Mr. R. I. Stevens of Delta was marshal for the day, and he had the pleasure of lining up about sixty of the brethren. The march to Christ Church was creditably performed, and on arriving they were comfortably seated. In addition, there was a large attendance of townspeople generally, so the auditorium was filled to overflowing. Following the beautiful ritualistic service, the rector, Rev. R. B. Patterson, M.A., delivered a most impressive and appropriate discourse on the motto of the order—Friendship, Love, and Truth—finding an appropriate text for each link of the chain in Eph. 4: 25; Gal. 5: 13; Cor. 5: 14. He presented the brotherhood man in a new and strong light, and pointed out clearly the interdependence of all. Societies were commendable and enduring only to the extent that in precept and practice they conformed to the divine original—the brotherhood of Christ. The whole discourse was most clear and logical, and was listened to very attentively by the large congregation.

On returning to the lodge room, a hearty vote of thanks was passed to the rector for his able discourse and to the choir for their excellent service of song. Local and visiting brethren delivered short addresses, appropriate to the occasion, and the meeting closed in regular form.

The Time Extended

The new act of Ontario house upon veterans' claims for land grants in New Ontario extends the time for filing applications until December next, it having expired in July, 1904. The act does a good thing also in legislating against transfers to speculators, some of whom have induced veterans to sell their rights for very small amounts.
