DUTY ON HARVESTERS.

A spirited tariff discussion took place recently in the House of Commons, when Mr. Shaffner, the Conservative member for Souris, Manitoba, moved that the duty on mowers and binders be reduced from 17 1/2 per cent. to 10 per cent. This proposition was supported by Mr. Staples, Dr. Roche, Mr. Lake and Mr. Herron, Conservative representatives of Manitoba and the other prairie provinces.

The west is naturally interested in this matter, for it was in Manitoba that Sir Wilfrid and his friends promised entirely free farm machinery.

In the debate referred to, some of these pledges of the Premier and his colleagues were read, and it was shown that while the Conservatives had reduced the harvest duty from 35 per cent. to 20 per cent., the Laurier Government had, in ten years, made no change from the tariff they denounced.

In the eleventh year they reduced the duty from 20 to 17 1/2 per cent., and compensated the manufacturers for that by special regulation, admitting their raw material free.

Several eastern Conservatives supported Mr. Shaffner's motion, which was rejected by a vote of 84 to 36. The vote in favor of lower duties was wholly Conservative, the solid Liberal party, including all the Government supporters from the West, declaring for the tariff as it is. While some Opposition members did not vote for the proposed reduction, a number of strong protectionists supported the motion, holding that ten per cent. was adequate protection for harvester manufacturers who had free raw material and were reported to be prosperous. It was also pointed out that the small decrease in the duty made by the Government had not affected the price, and that nothing less than the substantial reduction proposed would give the farmer cheap machines.

Rough play will be heavily penalized in the National Lacrosse Union this summer. Twenty minute rests are to be imposed upon players indulging in a pugilistic style of play. This punishment ought to have a considerable effect in making the game a cleaner one than it has hitherto been.

CHRIST CHURCH VESTRY

Christ Church adjourned vestry meeting was held last Monday evening. The Rector, Rev. Rural Dean McCoach, presided. There was a very good attendance.

Very encouraging reports were read from the different organizations connected with the church.

Messrs. Woodward, Williams, and Morton were appointed a committee to assist the Rector and Wardens in increasing the revenue of the church. W. E. Rispin and H. Gilles were re-elected to act as Glebe committee. The Financial Report was certified to by the Wardens as being correct.

Votes of thanks were passed to the Senior and Junior Guilds, Woman's Auxiliary, S. S. officers and teachers, choir, Senior and Junior Chapters of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and the Sidesmen for their helpful and willing services.

A meeting of the Registered Veterans of Christ Church was held immediately after the close of the vestry meeting. The following gentlemen were appointed lay representatives to the Synod of Huron for Christ Church: Messrs. W. E. Rispin, R. A. Williams and A. C. Woodward.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Wilson for the able services he has given the church for many years as lay representative of Christ Church and as a leading member of the different synods of the church.

Mr. Wilson, in returning thanks, expressed himself as being very thankful for being relieved from the office of lay representative, feeling as he did that the different offices he held in the synods of the church made too great an inroad on his time. For some time he had wished to withdraw from taking such an active part, owing to the time consumed, and would now have a very good excuse for doing so. He referred to the many responsible positions he had the honor of holding in the councils of the church and the large amount of time he had given.

REPORTERS ARE EXCLUDED

Colonial Conference Is A Star Chamber Affair This Time

Earl Of Elgin Presides At The Gathering Of Premiers

London, April 16.—At the opening of the Colonial Conference Lord Elgin read a telegram from King Edward welcoming the Premiers and expressing a wish for the success of the Conference. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman followed, welcoming officially on behalf of the Government the Premiers, and the King's telegram was answered in turn by each of them. After the official welcome the British Cabinet Ministers withdrew, and the conference proceeded to discuss the future course of business. It was decided that Ministers other than Prime Ministers and their secretaries should be admitted to the conference; it was also decided that in future meetings of the conference the press would not be admitted. The Canadian Associated Press understands that no decision has been arrived at as to how far future proceedings will be made public, when the conference adjourns.

Reporters Excluded.

London, April 16.—The fourth conference between the Premiers of Great Britain's self-governing colonies and the British Colonial Secretary was opened yesterday at the Colonial Office under the presidency of the Earl of Elgin, Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Reporters are not admitted to the conference, so the public will have to be contented with strictly censored official summaries of each day's proceedings until a blue book on the conference is issued, months after its final adjournment.

The Premiers present included Dr. Jameson, of Cape Colony; General Louis Botha, Premier of the Transvaal; Alfred Deakin, the Australian Premier; Sir Joseph O. Ward, Premier of New Zealand; Frederick R. Moor, Premier of Natal; and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada. Premier Sir Robert Bond, of Newfoundland, will arrive in the middle of the week. The Premiers were accompanied by their advisers. A number of British Cabinet Ministers attended the morning session. Premier Campbell-Bannerman opened the proceedings with a speech of welcome in which he outlined the subjects for discussion, such as preferential trade between the colonies and Great Britain and among the colonies themselves, a project providing for a permanent council, Imperial defence schemes and immigration, with minor questions, like penny postage, naturalization laws. The Premier earnestly expressed the hope that the deliberations would have useful results. Each of the colonial Premiers made a brief reply, after which the conference discussed the procedure and adjourned. Meetings will be held three times a week and they are expected to last at least a month.

Laurier Opposed Publicity.

Premier Campbell-Bannerman's speech yesterday was largely composed of generalities. He only touched lightly on the subject of tariff preferences which to the colonial representatives is the most important matter to come before the conference and one on which they hope an agreement will be reached satisfactory to all parties concerned.

In regard to the decision not to admit reporters to the daily sessions, it is stated that the colonial representatives were as a rule in favor of publicity, but the Home Government was opposed to it, and it is understood that Premier Laurier supported the home officials in this matter.

CANADA STILL UNCERTAIN.

In regard to the question of preferential tariff for the colonies.

The publication of the official agenda for the Colonial Conference gives special importance to the proposal that the time had come for Canada to make some offer to the British Empire.

The official agenda shows how decisive is the attitude in all other self-governing colonies. In the Australian Commonwealth, the Government which has just returned to power after the general election re-affirms the resolutions of the 1902 conference in favor of preferential trade and adds: "It is desirable that the United Kingdom grant preferential treatment to products and manufactures of the colonies."

The Cape Colony Government, while re-affirming the resolutions of 1902 and adhering to the principle of preference for British manufactures "desires to impress upon His Majesty's Government the opinion that the continuance of such preferential treatment to producers and manufacturers of Britain is largely dependent upon granting some reciprocal privileges to the British Colonies."

The Government of New Zealand, while also endorsing preference to British goods, considers it essential that Britain concede a preference to Colonial products, which are now taxed under existing British revenue tariff.

Canada Second to None. Canada alone makes no suggestions, though, as The Times says in editorial: "Whatever form they took, the ideas of the great community, which is foremost among the States of the Empire would be received with interest and attention."

It is felt that the position at the Conference will be greatly strengthened if she came into line with these other Colonial utterances, by re-affirming by resolution of the Dominion Parliament her desire as was formally expressed by the Canadian Ministers at the 1902 conference that in the interests of Canada and the whole Empire, "the Imperial Government would accept the principle of preferential trade generally and grant to the food products of Canada from the duties now levied or hereafter imposed."

Other Colonial Governments feel it necessary, without in any way interfering with British policies and speaking solely in the interests of their own Colonies and the Empire at large, to re-affirm their attitude of 1902. A re-affirmation by Canada on similar lines would formally bring before the Conference the attitude of the Dominion Government as explained by Mr. Fielding's budget speech last November.—Windermere in Montreal Star.

TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

DOVER COUNCIL.

The council met at the Clerk's office, April 6. The members were all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. Jos. Thomas stated that an immigrant he had hired as a farm hand was sick at his place for about a month and asked the council to have something done for him. A letter was read from Dr. Mitchell, M. H. O. for Chatham Township, stating there is a case of small-pox in that township, close to Baldoon Farm, Dover, Edward Fleming and Matthew Hoover made application to have Hoover drain repaired. Copies were read of the agreement between the townships of Chatham and Dover re the repair and improvement of Boyle and Ouellette drains, respectively. From St. Luke's Club re the expenditure of statute labor tax levied on their lands.

Moved by Fox and Carron, that John Harris be paid \$1 for pathmaster's return.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that the treasurer be instructed to credit each of the four divisions with the following respective funds, being the proportionate shares of the appropriation for roads and bridges for 1907, namely, first division \$202.40, second division \$202.55, third division \$165.92, fourth division \$223.12.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Crawford, that the grievance of Wm. H. Ruhnke be referred to Mr. Fox with power.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Carron, that S. T. Martin be paid \$150 for building a bridge over Ouellette drain improvement at 3rd concession road, Dover West, as per agreement.—Carried.

Moved by Foy and Carron, that S. Gervais, assessor, be paid \$95 part salary.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Crawford, that F. J. Robert be paid \$10 per cent of T. McQueen, commissioner of the concession Mechanical drain.—Carried.

Moved by Fox and Crawford, that the title grievance of Charles Dunlop be referred to Mr. Foy with power.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Carron, that before taking any action on the engineer's report for the proposed Blind Relief drain, the council in a body go over and inspect the proposed course of said drain, on Monday, April 15, to meet at Winter Line where the Boyle drain crosses it, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.—Carried.

Moved by Fox and Crawford, that the grievance of Alfred Barnier re water coming on his land, be referred to Mr. Carron to investigate and report.—Carried.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that the application to repair the Hoover drain be adopted, and J. W. Shiekleton be instructed to examine said drain, make an assessment, etc., and report to the council.—Carried.

Moved by Fox and Crawford, that the Reeve be instructed to have Edward Martin kept at the hospital for about three weeks if necessary.—Carried.

Norman Wemp was paid \$6.50 for coal and wood to Wm. Leguille and Charles Points while quarantined re small-pox.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that Jahne & Hinneberg be paid \$21 re funeral expenses of Bazille Matt.—Carried.

Wm. Tinny was refunded \$1.50 statute labor tax charged in error and \$1 be paid him for pathmaster's return, and R. Brown's \$1 for similar returns, and the Clerk \$50 on salary.

Moved by Carron and Foy, that the council has come to the conclusion that concrete backing be put in between the steel piles and wings on the highway bridges over the Boyle drain.—Carried.

The council adjourned to the call of the Reeve.
