In December, 1909, the Kaiser appeared for the first time as the conductor of an orchestra. This was at Wendeck. A cavalry band had delighted him with some selections, and he ordered them to play some old military marches. He took the baton from the bandmaster, stepped on the latter's raised platform in the midst latter's raised platform in the midst of the players, and conducted the band for some time. On another occasion, in the presence

On another occasion, in the presence of that famous French actor, Coquelin, the Kaiser was annoyed because the band was playing one of his favorite works too slowly. He seized the conductor's baton, and made the musicians play it considerably faster Then he returned to his suite. When Coquelin phrased the proper compliment, the Kaiser said, "Every one must be able to do for himself what

he considers to be necessary."

In German dramatic life the Kaiser is ambitious of taking a great part.
He frames plays, especially those which have as their theme the glories which have as their theme the glories of the Hohenzolierns. He arranges for scenic effects, and is a severe critic of performances. Above all, the Emperor is a strict censor of plays. Paul Hoyse; a German dramatist, declared that his play on Mary Magdalen was suppressed by the personal order of the Kaiser.

THE RICK FARMER OF JAPAN.

The rice farmer always has been the necessary and leading factor in Japan's economic life. One of the most characteristic sights in Japan is this tiller of the soil plowing kn deep with his shaggy pony in his water covered rice field. This plant will not thrive unless flooded to six inches or more with water, when th roots will sprout out in vigorous di-rections and a full crop will be pro-duced. His farm is cut up into sevduced. His farm is cut up into several inundated patches, which are irrigated by water pumped out of ditches by a treadmill arrangement. These small patches to the eye seem perfectly level, but there is just sufficient slope to allow the water to drain slowly through the furrows until the first field is covered. The others are arranged in terraces, one a few inches below the other, and the water is allowed to drain from one field to the next, and in this way one field to the next, and in this way is used over and over again.
