TO ENFORCE REGULATIONS

Ald. Potter Will Make An
Effort To Have Gas In
Opera House

MONDAY'S EXPERIENCE

"I saw an article in to-night's Planet stating that the lights in the Opera House went out at the conclusion of the show the other night, and while the people were making their way down the stairs," said Ald. Wm. Potter in conversation with a reporter for this G. H. J. last night. "This was a most regrettable and dangerous state of affairs, and there should be provision made that such a thing could not occur. There should be gas lights as well as electric lights in the Opera House, if the by-law were carried out to the letter, and I am going to see that the rules are enforced. Such a thing as that which occurred Monday evening will not happen again, I'll guarantee that. If the Fire Chief doesn't see to it that emergency lights are placed in the main portion of the building and the corridors, I will order the Chief of Police to have the place closed up till the regulations are lived up to. "I spoke about this matter before, and the manager of the Opera House told me that he would rather not put in gas as it was dangerous. There was some other kind of strong light which he would prefer for safety's sake. I told him to go ahead and put it in, and if it proved satisfactory all well and good. If not, why gas would have to be installed. As the house is at present, the regulations are not being lived up to, and I am going to see that they are. "If there had been a stampede the other night much serious injury to the people rushing down the stairs might have ensued. As it was I am told, a number of ladies had their dresses torn by men tramping on them."
