CURRENT COMMENT.

The Planet sent to a friend for a year ago a Christmas gift which reminded him of the donor upwards of 300 in that period.

The Chatham News should cease turning out nonsense about redistribution in the province, especially in Kent. It might at least secure a snap of Kent county and study the day of the land before parceling out the municipalities into new ridings.

For the first time in ten years the town of Dresden will have a representative in the County Council next year. During the entire period the date act was in force no Dresden man sat in the County Council. Dresden has reason to rejoice at the change in the act, even if Warden Sturgis sorrow—Ridgeway Dominion.

We are convinced that that is the right policy not only for Canada but for the Empire as well. Mr. Borden should come out flat-footed for high tariff and inter-imperial preference.—Brockville Times.
