RUPTURE IS COMPLETE.

Relations Are Formally Severed Be-
tween France and Venezuela.Caracas, Jan. 15.—(Via Port of Spain,
Trinidad, Jan. 15).—The Venezuelan
Government, having continued to ab-
stain from renewing relations with
France, through M. Taigny, the French
charge d'affaires, Mr. Russell, the
American Minister yesterday (Wed-
nesday) afternoon, delivered a note to
Venezuela on behalf of France severing
relations between the two countries.The archives and interests of France
remain in the hands of Mr. Russell.
M. Taigny has been recalled.Communication by way of the French
Cable Co.'s line is prohibited, and de-
patches must be sent by way of the
Island of Trinidad.

Roundabout Cable Communication.

New York, Jan. 15.—The Commercial
Cable Co., announced yesterday that it
has been advised by the Venezuelan
Government that telegraphic communi-
cation with Venezuela is open by way
of Trinidad and Amacura. Despatches
are forwarded between those points
daily.

FOUR PERISH IN FIRE

Half a Household Die in Flames
at Portage la Prairie.H. A. Brazil's Residence Destroyed,
With Three Children and an Aged
Aunt of His Wife—He Succeeded
in Saving His Wife and Three Chil-
dren From the Flames—Man Burned
to Death in New York.Portage la Prairie, Jan. 15.—A hol-
ocaust occurred early yesterday morn-
ing, about four miles east of town, when
the home of H. A. Brazil was destroyed
by fire and three of his family, be-
sides an aged aunt of his wife's, were
burned to death.The household consisted of Mr. and
Mrs. Brazil, six children and an aunt
of Mrs. Brazil's, Catherine Quinn.
All were sleeping in the second-stor-
ey except Brazil, who was asleep down-
stairs.About 4 o'clock he was awakened by
one of the children yelling "Fire!" He
jumped out of bed, but as he could
not see any fire in the house he had
the tried to re-enter the house. When
he tried to re-enter the house he was
driven back by a cloud of flame and
smoke.He succeeded in saving his wife and
three children, but the others perished.
It is not known what started the fire.
The flames broke out from the fire-
place.New York, Jan. 15.—As the firemen
were about to rescue him, J. A. Hart,
an insurance agent living on the top
floor of the four-story apartment
house at 45 West 95th street, which was
destroyed by fire early yesterday, was
overwhelmed by the flames and burned
to death.

Run Attired in Night Clothes.

Indian Head, Sask., Jan. 15.—The
general store of Crawford & Co., the
oldest and finest in town, was totally
destroyed by fire yesterday morning.The loss will reach a total of nearly
\$25,000, about half of which is covered
by insurance. Several tenants who had
apartments in the block had narrow
escapes and saved nothing of personal
effects but what they were able to dig
hurriedly.

Two Babies Burn.

Traverse City, Mich., Jan. 15.—While
Mrs. Geo. Belder of Thompsonville was
busy in the barn at her home Satur-
day, the house in which she had left
her two young babies alone caught fire,
and both of them lost their lives.

Apron Caught on Fire.

Kingston, Jan. 15.—Miss Cora Mc-
Nally, daughter of Michael McNally,
North Burgess, was badly burned while
working around the stove. In lifting a
pot from the stove she used her apron,
which caught fire, and the young lady's
clothing was enveloped in flames. Alone
at the time she ran out doors, and her
mother hearing her cries, caught her
and rolled her in the snow. She was
badly burned.

ORDER OF THE GARTER.

Its Alleged Ballroom Origin Only
Legendary Romance.The origin of the Order of the Golden
Fleece is, like that of the Garter,
shrouded in mystery. Very few mod-
ern archaeologists attach any credence
to the vulgar tradition, wholly unsup-
ported by any authority, that a court
ball given by Edward III. a lady, sup-
posed to be the Countess of Salisbury,
dropped her garter, and the king, tak-
ing it up and observing some of his
courtiers to smile as though they
thought he had not obtained this favor
merely by accident, exclaimed in a
loud voice, "Honi soit qui mal y pense."There is another opinion which traces
the origin of this order, which, accord-
ing to the learned Seldon, "exceeds in
majesty, honor and fame all the chiv-
alrous orders in the world," to Richard
Coeur de Lion having upon the occa-
sion of some warlike expedition during
his wars in Palestine chosen a leath-
ern garter as the distinctive mark of
his partisans. Yet another theory
asserts the foundation of the order to
be the fact that Edward at the battle
of Crecy issued his garter as a signal for
battle, which, proving successful, deter-
mined him to institute the order in
memory of the event.Both these opinions are to a certain
extent feasible, and the first is mat-
terially fortified by the well known fact
that when the crusaders captured St.
Jean d'Acre in a nocturnal assault the
knights of the Christian army were or-
dered to wear straps of white leather
in order to distinguish them from the
infidels.
