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## MAYOR ACTS

By-Law to be put Through at To-  
night's Session to Oust P. M. from  
Head St.

Some time ago the Mayor was  
given power to act in the Head street  
spur matter. The result is that at  
to-night's session of the City Coun-  
cil he will introduce a resolution  
that the tracks be removed.

This is the result of a conference  
with the city solicitor, who has but  
recently returned. For thirty days  
after the passing of the resolution ob-  
jections to it will be received. If  
there are any they will be heard  
and taken into consideration.

## KILLED BY A TRAIN.

Unknown Man Run Down by Freight  
Near Port Hope.

Port Hope, Sept. 18.—An unknown  
man was struck and instantly killed  
by a freight train between 7 and 8 o'clock  
Saturday night.

The body is that of a man between  
35 and 40 years of age, about 6 feet  
in height, and 200 pounds in weight,  
and of a fair complexion.

He was rather poorly clothed, in a  
dark grey tweed suit, and a small coin  
was all the money found in the pocket-  
ets, along with several small articles.

The dead man is believed to have  
been a Frenchman, who had been not-  
iced wandering about the neighbor-  
hood during the afternoon. The only  
wound inflicted was a deep gash on the  
back of the head.

## Small Boy's Wanderings.

Ottawa, Sept. 18.—George Prud-  
homme, aged 41-2 years, strayed from  
his home on Thursday. He has been  
located in Montreal in the Chenneville  
street police station, but how he got  
there is a mystery. The Montreal po-  
lice found him on the streets. He is  
too young to tell anything about it. He  
evidently strayed down to the Central  
station and got on board a train.

## Race Fight in Tennessee.

Germantown, Tenn., Sept. 18.—A  
clash between white men and negroes  
occurred here Saturday, in which Eu-  
gene Scott, a constable, was shot and  
stabbed; a negro named Smith, from  
Cordova was killed. Robert Harr of  
Germantown was cut about the head,  
and three or more negroes shot. Fifty  
or more shots were exchanged. The  
trouble arose over a race.

## Came Back With His Man.

Shanghai, Sept. 18.—The British  
Vice-Consul, who left here last Friday  
for Quinsan to secure the release of a  
British subject held prisoner there by  
the Chinese authorities, returned yester-  
day with the man.

## Lynch Law For Chinese.

Johannesburg, Sept. 18.—Owing to  
the leniency with which Chinese as-  
saulters of white women have been  
treated by the courts a private meet-  
ing of miners was held Saturday night,  
at which it was decided to apply lynch  
law and shoot all offenders when they  
were caught.

Gen. Maritz, the only Boer general  
who joined the German forces in the  
campaign against the Herreros, in Ger-  
man Southwest Africa, has resigned  
his position as commander of trans-  
vaal and has returned to the Trans-  
vaal. He says the Herrero rebellion is  
spreading, that Chief Witthof's fol-  
lowers are well armed, and that their  
members are constantly increasing.

## Will Plead Insanity.

Windsor, Sept. 18.—J. H. Rodd,  
County Crown Attorney for Essex  
County, has decided to have the trial  
of Alfred Horton take place at the Fall  
Assizes which open at Sandwich Sep-  
tember 25. Horton is charged with  
shooting his wife and father-in-law  
with intent to commit murder.

J. W. Hanna has charge of the de-  
fence, and he intimated Saturday that  
his client was insane when he com-  
mitted the deed.

## Lived With Bullet In Heart.

Cadillac, Mich., Sept. 18.—After liv-  
ing for more than eight years with a  
revolver bullet in his heart and in de-  
fiance of the death warrants given him  
by the Chicago physicians who at-  
tended him, Charles B. Nelson, who  
was shot by an unidentified negro in  
Washington Park, July 1, 1897, died  
yesterday.

## CHEESE MARKETS.

Cowansville, Que., Sept. 16.—At the week-  
ly meeting of the Eastern Townships Dairy  
men's Exchange, held here to-day, 24 cam-  
eries offered 1421 boxes butter; 22 factories  
offered 948 boxes cheese. Sales butter: H.  
H. Hubbard, 100 boxes at 22c; 370 boxes at  
21 1/2c, and 110 at 21 1/4c; Hugh Allen, 13c  
boxes at 21 1/2c; unsold, 637 boxes. Sales of  
cheese: H. H. Hubbard, 223 boxes at  
10 1/2c and 87 boxes at 10 1/4c; Hugh Allen,  
248 boxes at 10 1/2c and 26 boxes at 10 1/4c;  
unsold, 302 boxes. Buyers evidently were  
not anxious to purchase, as some of them  
did not put up the necessary deposit in  
order to qualify them to buy at the board.  
Brockville, Sept. 16.—Offerings to-day  
were 400 boxes half-colored. Sales were  
1025 at 11 1/2c and 1367 at 11 1/4c.  
London, Sept. 16.—Seventeen factories  
offered a total of 2364 boxes of cheese at  
to-day's meeting—250 white, balance col-  
ored. Sales were made as follows: 185 to  
Booth at 11 1/2c, 190 to Elwell at 11 1/4c,  
290 to Blissett at 11 1/2c, 150 to Palmyra at  
11 1/4c, 180 to Booth at 11 1/2c, 80 to J. Hus-  
ton at 11 1/2c, 155 to Blissett at 11 1/4c;  
market was active; next market Sept. 23.
