SWIFT CURRENT LIGHT
Swift Current last week granted a
franchise for electric light and power
and for natural gas.
The prices for electric light are to
be at the following monthly rates:
on yearly contracts for residences
1 to 5 lights, 18 candle power lamps
at 70 cents per light; 6 to 12, 16
candle power, 85 cents per light; 13
to 20, 16 c.p., 60 cents per light; 21
Offices and shops, etc., 1 to 5, 16 c.p.,
65 cents per light; 6 to 12, 16 c.p.,
55 cents; 13 to 20, 16 c.p., 50
cents.
The lights shall be on from 5 p.
till 1 a.m., and from 5.30 a.m. till
daylight.
Every consumer may purchase and
use a meter, and the meter rates
shall be as follows:
Less than 20 kilowatts per month,
18 cents per kilowatt; 20 k. or over,
17 cents; 40 k. or over, 16 cents;
100 or over, 15 cents; and a propor-
tionate reduction up to 1,000 k.
when the price will be 9 cents.
The price of gas will be as follows:
50 cents per 1,000 feet until the popu-
lation reaches 1,500; when the
maximum rate will be reduced to 40
cents; when the population reaches
2,500 the rate shall be 35 cents; 3,
000 population, 30 cents.
At the expiration of the franchise
the town may purchase either the
electric or gas plant, or both, the
price to be determined by arbitration.
