

At the Carleton County Vocational School, Woodstock, there will be held a Short Course on Gas Engines and Tractors, starting on Tuesday, Feb-Tractors, starting on Tuesday, February 22, and ending February 26, 1921. The tractor manufacturing companies active in this territory, including the Ford, the International and the Case, will be represented. Each company will have in attendance a mechanical expert and a tractor mechan arranged for the purpose of instruc-tion and the field catered to will be confined to the educational.

This course caters to farmers and

their sons who are interested in power farming, garage and repair men asso-clated in any way with tractor work, and to those interested in matters

and to those interested in matters mechanical.

That each and every one present may receive the maximum possible instruction, the enrollment for this course will be limited. Everyone present will be given the opportunity to observe and perform much of the practical work in connection with tractors, including operation and driving, and this would not be possible under crowded conditions.

The course is FREE. It will be held in the Vocational School building, Woodstock, and the hours are from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, and from 1.30 p.m.
