HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Fish needs to be thoroughly sea-
soned. Twelve minutes to the pound
is the rule for baking. When possible
rub in coarse salt on both the out-
side and inside of the fish and allow
it to stand for some time, then wash
well and bake dry before baking.

It is no economy to purchase cheap
tinware; if of good quality it will
last for a long time, and is excellent
for many purposes. For layer cake,
or anything that requires quick cook-
ing, the best results are obtained in
tin, but neither tin, iron, nor steel,
should be used for acid foods. It is
said that peas and beans will not
cook soft in enamel ware, but will
soften quicker in tin. Never use tin
when fruit is to be cooked; porcelain
or enamel-lined ware is the proper
thing. Aluminum cooking utensils
are considered the best, but are ex-
pensive.

Some housekeepers when preparing
a fowl to roast, rub it inside and
out with sugar, stuff it as usual,
and when done the meat is said to
be much sweeter and juicier than if
prepared in the old way.

SELECTED RECIPES.

Nut Candy.—Two cups of brown
sugar, one cup of cream, one table-
spoonful of butter, cook until done,
stirring constantly. Add cup of nuts
(any kind or kinds), stir briskly un-
til candy sugars, and pour on marble
slab.

Sugar Candy.—One cup of sugar,
one tablespoonful of vinegar, small
pinch of butter and enough water to
cover sugar. Stir until sugar is dis-
solved, and cook until candy is brittle
in water. Pour into buttered
dishes and pull.

Chocolate Candy.—One pound of
light brown sugar, one-fourth of a
cup of chocolate, one cup of sweet
milk, one-half tablespoonful of but-
ter. Stir constantly, add butter af-
ter mixture has boiled. When done,
beat until thick and pour into but-
tered dishes.

Steamed Brown Bread.—One cup
white flour, 2 of graham flour, 2 of
Indian meal, one teaspoonful
soda, one cup molasses, three and one
half cups of milk, salt. Beat all to-
gether, steam or boil 4 hours, leave
in the oven 15 minutes to crisp after
being turned out. Eat warm.

A FEMINE WEAKNESS.

"Two cents apiece, two for a
nickel," said the storekeeper, and the
woman customer promptly bought
two and paid her nickel. "She never
tumbled," continued the storekeeper
then. "Really, I didn't intend to
fool her; it was merely a slip of
the tongue. We get so used to
doubling the price in order to make
sales that it becomes second nature
with us. Would you believe that I
tried for two weeks to sell some
canned goods at twelve cents a can,
but couldn't clean out the lot until
I raised them to two for a quarter?
Women are always looking for some-
thing for nothing—something that
looks like a bargain, and we have
to accommodate them if we want to
stay in business. When we fix prices
like two for a quarter we can al-
ways make women believe that they
get twenty-six cents' worth, though
they really pay an extra cent. When
we sell something at fifty-nine cents
any woman will believe that the
price ought to be sixty-two cents in-
stead of fifty-six or fifty-eight, and
therefore you will sell more coffee
and make more money if you sell
two pounds for fifty-nine cents than
if you insist on getting twenty-eight
cents a pound. It is a trick, but it
isn't our fault. The majority of
women want it that way."—Philadel-
phia Record.
