Luxury Taxes Help Increase The Revenue

Ottawa, Ont. Aug. 4—The effect of Canada's new luxury taxes are somewhat clearly shown in the excise tax returns available today. These returns include luxury sales and manufacturers' tax, and, while it is impossible to give exact figures on the actual amount of luxury tax, it is safe to say that already several millions have been added to the country's income as a result of Mr. Henry Drayton's 1926 budget.

Collections from all sources of the inland revenue branch for July amounted to \$9,828,051, as compared with \$4,258,453 for the corresponding month of last year, or an increase of \$5,569,598, which is more than one hundred per cent increase. On the excise tax side the amount collected last month totalled \$6,944,457 as compared with \$489,294 for the same month last year. This is another abnormal increase which reflects the effect of this year's legislation.
