### Synopsis et Canadian North-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, or any ma over 18 years old, who was at the co mencement of the present war, who has since continued to be a Britis subject or a subject of an allied or ne tral country, may homestead a quart section of available Dominion Land Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Albert Applicant must appear in person Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agen for District. Entry by proxy may made on certain conditions Six months residence upon and cultiva tion of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homestea may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acr Duties-Reside six months in each hree years after earning homestes patent and cultivate 50 acres extra May obtain pre-emption patent as soo as homestead patent on certain co

patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emp lion, may take a purchased homester in certain districts. Price \$3.00 pe acre. Must reside six months in eac of hree years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
