The regular meeting of the Presbytery of Huron was held in Willis church, Clinton, on Tuesday last, the moderator, Mr. Turnbull, in the chair. There were present twelve ministers and five elders. The session records of several congregations were examined and attested. Mr. Martin presented the report of the committee on Sabbath observance, Mr. Musgrave, the report of the committee on the state of religion, Mr. Thomson, Brucefield, the report of the Sabbath School committee. The following were appointed representatives to General Assembly: Messrs. Lochead, Stewart, Musgrave, McLean and Thomson, Brucefield, ministers; and Messrs. McLean, Anderson, Gray, Pollock and Whitford, elders. Rev. K. McLennan, Charlottetown, was nominated as moderator of the next General Assembly. The congregations of Kippen and Hills Green asked leave to moderate in a call to a minister when prepared to do so. As the present, however, appears to be a suitable time to consider whether any other arrangement of the congregations in that part of the Presbytery is possible or preferable to the present, and as the question has become urgent, the granting leave was deferred, and a committee consisting of Messrs. Turnbull, Musgrave and McCoy was appointed to visit these congregations and report at the next meeting of Presbytery. The congregation of Willis church, Clinton, asked and obtained permission to hold the lot which the church stands on, and also one half acre adjoining the same. Presbytery then adjourned to meet in Clinton on the second Tuesday of May, at half past ten, a. m.
