The endorsemen on an envelope is a matter of common convenience which, apart altogether from the moral side of the question, it is to the interest of everybody not to, abuse, since continued abuse will rob it of all value, and men with large correspondence will have either to waste hours on the irrelevant or surrender their most intimate afrs to a secretary.

Civilization is founded on good faith and is impossible without it. The difference between the civilized man is presumed to have value. Savages all over the world differ in everything but the one fact that they are invariably to be described as treacherous. to be described as treacherous.

Treachery, in fact, may be considered the distinguishing feature of the barbarian, and there is undenlably a sort of treachery in getting under a man's guard by marking as "private" a sample of coccasions. cocoa or a printed circular, apart from the fact that it is scarcely wise to begin by irritating a possible customer or supporter. In a civilized state we do not enforce things with bows and arrows or clubs; there is or hmeyery man living in such a state an ligation to play the game according to the rules and make his word good, abuse of the endorsement on en-velopes is only a petty matter, but is SHOULD NOT REMOVE symptomatic of an imperfect understanding of social obligations. It is worse than criminal; it is vulgar.


