Autumn Session.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The legislative programme of the Government has become so congested that the Cabinet has decided to resort to an autumn session. An official announcement was made to the House of Commons that Parliament will be adjourned on August 15th to reassemble at the end of October or the beginning of November. The interim preceding the adjournment will be occupied by the opposition on August 7th; disposal of the Veto Bill, August 18th, and the rest of the week will be devoted to the Finance Bill and a resolution providing for the payment of members.

Looters Shot.

Special Evening Telegram. PORT AU PRINCE, To-Day. Haiti without President or organized Government. The capital is occupied by two civil revolutionary parties, headed respectively by General Leconte, former Minister of the Interior, and General Firmin, who deserted his post as Haitian Minister to Britain to join the revolution against President Simon. A committee of public safety, organized through the initiative of the diplomatic corps, is maintaining public order. British and German marines have been landed to aid the provincial authorities. During the night there were attempts at pillage and it was necessary to shoot several looters. Energetic measures prevented any serious outbreak. By the Prospero last night some 25 tourists came along. They came down here from New York by the second last Stepano and then went north on the coastal boat. They were delighted with the scenery, climate, and country. They return home by this Stepano.

The Arbitration Treaty

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The Anglo-American arbitration treaty signed yesterday will be given out for publication in London and Washington simultaneously. Should the Commons be in session at the time, the unusual course will be adopted of submitting the treaty to the lower Chamber at the same time it goes to the States Senate. Otherwise it will be given to the press in the usual way.

Universal Peace.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. Three of the world's greatest nations have joined hands in opening the way to universal peace. Britain, States and France have signed general arbitration treaties for the peaceful settlement of all disputes that may be locked in the mystery of the future, even though they may concern national honor or vital interests of the signatories.

TEXT OF NAVAL AGREEMENT.

Newfoundland in the midst of a Naval Station which is termed Canada's "Own Naval Station." Canadian Naval Services and Forces under the Exclusive Control of the Dominion Government. Canadian Naval Vessels will not Fly Union Jack.—British Admiralty will have neither control nor knowledge of what Canadian Navy Does in Newfoundland.—Canadian Government can please itself whether it allows Canadian Navy to take part in Imperial War.

Canada's Own.
The full text of the memorandum follows:—

(1) The naval services and forces of the Dominions of Canada and Australia, will be their own respective governments.

(2) The training and discipline of the naval forces of the Dominions will be generally uniform with the training and discipline of the fleet of the United Kingdom, and by arrangement, officers and men of the said forces will be interchangeable with those under the control of the British Admiralty.

(3) The ships of each Dominion naval force will hoist at the stern the White Ensign as the symbol of the authority of the Crown, and at the jack staff the distinctive flag of the Dominion.

(4) The Canadian and Australian governments will have their own naval stations as agreed upon from time to time. The limits of the stations as considered desirable are set forth in schedule A for Canada, and in schedule B for Australia.

(5) In the event of the Canadian or Australian government desiring to send ships to a part of the British Empire outside their own respective stations, they will notify the British Admiralty.

In Foreign Port.
(6) In the event of the Canadian or Australian government desiring to send ships to a foreign port, they will obtain the concurrence of the Imperial Government, in order that the necessary arrangements with the Foreign Office may be made, as in the case of ships of the British Fleet, in such time and manner as is usual between the British Admiralty and the Foreign Office.

(7) While the ships of the Dominions are at a foreign port a report of their proceedings will be forwarded by the officer in command to the commander-in-chief on the station or to the British Admiralty. The officer in command of a Dominion ship, as long as he remains in a foreign port, will obey any instructions he may receive from the Government of the United Kingdom as to the conduct of any international matters that may arise, the Dominion Government being informed.

(8) The commanding officer of a Dominion ship, having to put into a foreign port without previous arrangement on account of stress of weather, damage, or any unforeseen emergency, will report his arrival and reason for calling to the commander-in-chief of the station, or to the Admiralty, and will obey, so long as he remains in the foreign port, any instructions he may receive from the Government of the United Kingdom as to his relations with the authorities, the Dominion Government being informed.

Mutual Agreement Regarding Orders.
(9)—When a ship of the British Admiralty meets a ship of the Dominion, the senior officer will have the right of command in matters of ceremony or international intercourse or where officer will take command, but not so as to interfere with the orders of the junior may have received from his own Government.

(10)—In foreign ports the senior vessel action is agreed upon, but will have no power to direct the movement of ships of the other service unless the ships are ordered to co-operate by mutual agreement.

(11)—When a Court-martial has to be ordered by a Dominion officer and a sufficient number of officers are not available in the Dominion service at the time, the British Admiralty, if requested, will make the necessary arrangements to enable a Court to be formed. Provision will be made by order of His Majesty-in-Council, and the Dominion Government, to define the condition under which officers of the different services are to sit on joint Court-martials.

Send Officers.
(12)—The British Admiralty undertakes to lead to the Dominion, during the period of development of their services, under conditions to be agreed upon, such flag officer and other officers and men as may be needed. In the selection preference will be given to officers and men coming from, or connected with, the Dominion but they should be all volunteers to the service.

(13)—The service of officers of the British fleet in the Dominion naval forces, or of officers of these forces in the British fleet, will count in all respects for promotion, pay, retirement, etc., as service in their respective forces.

(14)—In order to determine all questions of seniority that may arise, he names of all officers will be shown in the naval list, and their seniority determined by the date of their commission, which ever is the earlier, in the British, Canadian or Australian services.

In Time of War.
(15)—It is desirable, in the interests of efficiency and co-operation, that arrangements should be made from time to time between the British Admiralty and the Dominion Governments to the ships of the Dominions to take part in fleet exercises or for any other joint training considered necessary under the senior naval officer. While so employed, the ships will be under the control of the British Admiralty during the continuance of the war.

(16)—The Dominions having applied to their naval forces the King's Regulations, Admiralty instructions and the Naval Discipline Act, the British Admiralty and Dominion Governments will communicate to each other any changes which they propose to make in these regulations or that act.
