Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram LONDON, Sept. 4.

The Commission appointed by the Government to enquire into the trouble between the railroad companies of Britain and their employees, which led to the recent strikes, has already been in session for a week, and promises to be as long-lived as some of its predecessors. The Commission is taking evidence from the representatives of the men first. A whole week did not suffice to exhaust the flow of information, sought to be imparted by only four out of the host of officials from the different unions. There was not a good word said of the Conciliation Board scheme, fathered by Lloyd George in 1907. The general trend of the suggestions favored a board for each railroad, made up of an equal number of representatives of the men and the company, respectively, with a national board on which the companies and the men's unions should be equally represented. The witnesses objected to the appointment of an arbitrator as chairman of these boards, holding that if the men could not settle the dispute themselves, they could not be bound by the casting vote of such arbitrator if the terms were unacceptable. The only point on which there was complete unanimity among the four witnesses was a demand for recognition of Trade's unions as the only method for bringing about peace in the railroad system.

CHICAGO, Sept. 4. Gotch, world's champion, defeated Hackenschmidt in the wrestling match to-night.

Attacked a Policeman.

Shortly after 6 p.m. yesterday Constable Blundon, doing duty on Water Street West, was told that a man who was under the influence of drink lay on the other side of the Long Bridge and that he was bleeding copiously from what his informant believed were serious wounds on his face. The officer hastened to the man's aid and found that blood flowed freely from his nose, the result of a fall. The man was a fine strapping fellow, and immediately Blundon picked him up he was fiercely assaulted by the inebriate. The policeman received several vicious blows in the face, had his moustache torn and his cap knocked over the bridge into the water, where it was later picked up by men who went after it in a boat. After a desperate struggle and with the aid of some citizens the prisoner was overpowered and handcuffed, after which he was driven to the station in a cab. Here the prisoner, though manacled, again butted Blundon, and so violent was he that several officers had to hold him while the guard was taking his effects from his pockets. The man will likely pay dearly for his attack on the policeman.

Mr. Crosbie's Version.

In connection with the reference to the strike on the s.s. Rescue, which appeared in yesterday's Telegram, Hon. J. C. Crosbie asked our reporter last evening to give his side of the case, and of course we consented. Mr. Crosbie says that he had trouble with a man named Peddie, and that it was of such a character that he (Mr. Crosbie) will not permit him to work again on his premises. He is a Union man, and the members of the Longshoremen's Union declared that if this man was not employed they would not discharge the coal cargo of the s.s. Rescue now lying at his premises. The Bay Roberts men who went to work on the ship yesterday, Mr. Crosbie says, did so with their eyes open. There was no deception practised upon them and they were made aware of how matters stood before they came here. He further alleges that the Union men came down on Bennett's wharf adjoining his and by intimidation compelled the Bay Roberts men to quit work. Mr. Crosbie says that the Rescue can remain at his wharf for an indefinite period without discharging before he will permit Peddie to work on her. There was some talk last night of a strike on the Fogota, but Mr. Crosbie says that he will have the ship leave here on her usual schedule time.
