
THE LETTER APPENDED. St. John's Nfld Mr. R. W. Strong, Boston.

Dear Strong,—Your letter of 25th ult., came duly to hand and I note contents. I hope that you will succeed as well as you anticipate in disposing of the timber properties and that before long you will have something definite to communicate to me in that direction. I enclose you a plan of the Orange Bay property, which wishow its location clearly. You wi notice that the land has been taker on each side of the main river and it wo branches. From your experience of timber lands in Nfld., and particularly in that part of the country, you will know that the land in the rive valleys is always the choice locatio for timber. The man who holds lim its abutting on a river can log and drive his timber the cheapest, and until some other person locates behind him, there is nothing to prevent him from getting a good deal of timber from the adjoining Crown Land, The river will furnish a satisfactory pow-er for a small pulp operation, and


