A SECOND MEMORIAL

To His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams, Knight Commander of the Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and Over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

May it Please Your Excellency: I beg to submit respectfully in writing what I said on Saturday, the 13th inst., when I had the honour of waiting on Your Excellency as requested.

I pointed out on that occasion that the memorial of the 30th ult., directed the attention of Your Excellency to certain transactions in which the Hon. Donald Morison was concerned, during the time he has been a member of the Executive Council, and that I most respectfully entered a strong protest against the Hon. Donald Morison continuing any longer a member of Your Excellency's Council.

I did not address the memorial to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, nor did I suggest that Your Excellency should obtain the ruling of that gentleman on the issue raised; such a reference, I am aware, is entirely within the discretion of Your Excellency, and it would have been entirely out of place on my part to have made such a suggestion.

I did, however, pray that Your Excellency would be pleased to forward a copy of the communication to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, as I was of opinion that the facts of the matter, the question at issue and the reasons for the request, would form a leading case on the conventions which govern the conduct of ministers of the Crown in the Colonial Dominions of His Majesty King George V., and should find a place in the archives of the Colonial Office.

After the conversation with which Your Excellency favoured me about the letter of April 6th, 1909, published in the Evening Telegram, on April 8th, 1912, I have decided to pray Your Excellency to take official cognizance of it.

I would, however, submit that the words to which I shall later specially direct the attention of Your Excellency, raise an absolutely new question which should receive a ruling separate and apart from any ruling which Your Excellency may feel it your duty to make on the prayer of the petition of the 30th ult.

It appears to me that it is absolutely essential to the future welfare of Newfoundland for Your Excellency to decide whether the Hon. Donald Morison can remain a member of the Council of Your Excellency after playing the part he played in the transactions set forth in the memorial of the 30th ult. Whatever ruling Your Excellency may make, its influence in the future Government of Newfoundland must be decisive and far-reaching. I would, however, most respectfully urge on Your Excellency that any ruling which would permit the Hon. Donald Morison to retain his seat in the Executive Council will create a precedent which will have a most damaging effect on good government in this Colony. I submit, therefore, that the issue raised is one which should receive a ruling separate from any which Your Excellency may be pleased to give in regard to the letter of April 6th, 1909, which I append. It would appear that the subject matter of the letter has nothing to do with the transactions of the Anglo-American Development Company, Ltd. It relates to a timber property in Newfoundland, the limits of the Company just mentioned are, however, situated in the Labrador.

In regard to that letter, I beg to direct the special attention of Your Excellency to the following words:—"The man who holds limits abutting on a river can log and drive his timber the cheapest, and until some other persons locate behind him, there is nothing to prevent him from getting a good deal of timber from the adjoining Crown Land."

A reference to Section 38 of the Crown Lands Act, 1903, will show that the holder of a grant is prohibited from cutting timber on Crown Lands under a penalty of \$20 for every tree cut.

The letter is addressed to Mr. R. W. Strong, Boston, and signed D. Morison, who at that time was Minister of Justice, and his duty was to see that the law was respected. A copy of the letter I append. I have compared it with the original, which is in the possession of Mr. W. F. Lloyd, Editor of the Evening Telegram, who is ready to produce it for the inspection of Your Excellency. In this connection also, I protest strongly against the retention by the Hon. Donald Morison, of the Office of Minister of Justice and of a seat in the Executive Council, and I pray also that Your Excellency may be pleased to forward a copy of this communication to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and for public information I shall deem it advisable to publish it. THE LETTER APPENDED.

St. John's, Nfld.,
April 6, 1909.

Dear Strong—Your letter of 25th ult., came duly to hand and I note contents. I hope that you will succeed as you anticipate in disposing of the timber properties and that before long you will have something definite to communicate to me in that direction. I enclose you a plan of the Orange Bay property, which will show its location clearly. You will notice that the land has been taken on each side of the main river and its two branches. From your experience of timber lands in Nfld., and particularly in that part of the country, you will know that the land in the river valleys is always the choice location for timber. The man who holds limits abutting on a river can log and drive his timber the cheapest, and until some other person locates behind him, there is nothing to prevent him from getting a good deal of timber from the adjoining Crown Land. The river will furnish a satisfactory power for a small pulp operation, and I do not see, for the size of it, a better property or one that can be more easily or cheaply worked than this Orange Bay property.

I note what you say about the electric franchise for Bonaville and Trinity, but nothing can be done in that direction until the House of Assembly meets. The House opened on March 30th, but on account of the political deadlock, could not elect a Speaker. The House was then adjourned until to-day, and it has since been postponed until Saturday next. Between this and Saturday I expect the House will be dissolved and an election proclaimed, which will take place in the early part of next month. Nothing, therefore, can be done with regard to the franchise until the House of Assembly meets and is in position to do business. I will see if I can get hold of two copies of the charter of the Twillingate Electrical Co. and if so, will forward same to your address under separate cover.
