WEEKLY MEETING.

The Weekly Meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afteroon, Mayor Gosling and Councilors Morris, Mullaly, Ayre, Jackman, Peet and Vinnicombe were present.

After the minutes of the last meeting were confirmed the following matters were disposed of.

Minister of Mines & Agriculture is to be asked for conditions of lease to be given Mr. Tavernor, Signal Hill. The Council have no objections to land being used as a quarry.

P. F. Collins suggested that the Council flood portion of Bannerman Park around Band Stand for open air rink. The Council did not consider same practicable or advisable.

Arrangements are to be made with Mr. Silverlock to have the Whippet Tank loaned by the Government put in working order for snow clearing

City Appraisers Godden and White are to be instructed to proceed with the Triennial Appraisement of pro-

Health Officer Brehm reported cases of Diphtheria and 1 of Typhoid Fever in the city during the past

The matter of nonpayment of City Taxes was the subject of considerable discussion and as the City's revenue has suffered through the negligence of taxpayers in this connection, it was unanimously decided that notice be inserted in the daily papers that, on and after March 1st, legal proceedings will be taken to recover the taxes due, and the names of parties to be proceeded against and the amounts need of further extension of water owed by them be published.

The City Engineer reported on the need of further extension of water and sewer mains. Careful consideration was given the matter and the following resolution was adopted: "Whereas the necessity exists for the extension of new water mains and for laying of new storm and sanitary sewers and taking into consideration the lack of employment existing in the city, that arrangements should be made to proceed with the work as soon as weather conditions permit, and that the Mayor he authorized to negotiate a loan of Eighty or One Hundred Thousand dollars for the above purposes."

The condition of the stables is of such a character that it is a very difficult matter to keep the horses in good condition; they are in a leaky dilapidated state and through age and decay necessarily have to be replaced. It is impossible in their present con-

The closets at King's Cove and Wood's Dock should be replaced. The King's Cove closet could be connected with the sewer and cleansed every

dition to do any effective repairs.

Owing to the great number of streets being opened up and building operations going on, it will become necessary, during the summer, to make provision for another horse and cart. For instance, a cart commencing at the head of Carter's Hill has to go up Prince of Wales' Street, down Franklin Avenue, and from thence to Gear Street. There are at least, two loads of ashes in these streets and the build ing of other houses in those localities must mean the providing of another horse and cart to do the work of removal of ashes and garbage proper-

The work of the Council in enforcing the provision of the law by requiring the connection of all suitable houses with the sewerage system has had the desired effect of reducing very con siderably the operations of the nightsoil car. Seven years ago there were sixteen night-soil cars operating night y. If houses continue to be connected with the city water and sewerage system at the same rate during the com ing summer as in he past two or three years there will be necessary only wo or three cars to perform work that formerly required sixteen. As an llustration of the improvements effected in this direction seven years igo there were on an average of one lundred and twelve loads a week and it the present time there are only about forty-nine a week.

In a great many portions of the city he gullies and drains are in a bad state and will need considerable rebairs and will need considerable reairs when the season permits the work to be done.
