## Girls Acquire Firm Hands Through Physical Training.

CHESTER, Pa.—Widespread participation in athletics by girls is developing powerful fingers and firm hand grips, according to records compiled by the department of psychology and physical education at Darlington Seminary, a school for girls here. "Measures of muscular power taken on a recording instrument known as a dynamometer," said Prof. Frank Paxon Bye, director of the school, have disclosed marked development in the hand grips of virtually all Darlington students. Under a system of compulsory athletics our girls have added from three to twenty kilograms of hand strength. "Modern girls do not feel a sense of loss with the departure of delicate hands. On the contrary, they view this development as a part of the modern athletic programme to provide them with strong, glowing bodies and alert mentalities. "Similar development in muscular effort is noted by tests for the arms, back and legs. Basketball, hockey, baseball, riding and swimming are conducive to this general growth of power. However, a firm, strong grip from the hand is frequently accepted as an indication of a staunch frame and good mentality. It is indicative of proper co-ordination between mind and muscles."

## Mussolini Urged to Rescue Europe.

VIENNA.—Fascism is coming to be regarded in Austria as a panacea for all the ills of Central Europe, in the opinion of some observers in the Austrian capital, and its leader, Benito Mussolini, as a second Garibaldi. A letter from Count Richard Coudenhove-Kalergi, founder of the Central European Cultural Society, addressed to Mussolini and published recently in a local newspaper, bears out this thought.

The count writes: "I appeal to you to save the youth of Europe. Germany and France have been at war for 1,000 years. Italy alone is qualified to end this war, to lay the foundation for the restoration of Europe. "You love Italy, but no European nation can live and thrive if the others die. Look across the ocean. At a time when Europe, from the Rhine to Thrace, is tearing itself to pieces, an entire continent is preparing to assemble at Santiago, Chile, in a spirit of trust and hope and in the service of peace and progress."

"Proclaimed a century ago by Bolivar, the Pan-American idea has become to-day the keynote of the development of the world. United America is marching at its apex, while divided Europe is bleeding to death in internal warfare."

"Summon the first Pan-European conference in Rome; launch a new Europe."

"Both Great Britain and Russia have outgrown Europe and can survive her destruction, but the other peoples of Europe have the choice only between union or destruction."

"Europe is not threatened from the north. Economic dangers menace her from the west and political perils from the east. A divided Europe must fall a prey to American competition; a

disunited Europe will become the victim of Russian leadership. Only an economic union, a court of arbitration, and a treaty can give Europe prosperity, peace and independence. "Save Europe from her fate. Step into the European chaos courageously and lay the foundation stone of the United States of Europe."

## Future for Austria Becoming Brighter.

VIENNA.—Austria presents a brighter picture to-day than at any time since the war. The crown is steadily appreciating in value, unemployment is lessening, the cost of living is falling, and the spirit of the population is improving. The allied loan apparently has ushered in a new era for a people which has suffered bitterly during the last 10 years.

The budget shows a remarkable improvement, the deficit since November having been reduced by nearly 3 billion crowns (about \$4,500,000), representing a reduction of 55 per cent. Bank deposits have notably increased, which is regarded as an indication of increasing confidence in the general economic and financial situation of the country, especially in the national currency. During January the total deposits increased by nearly thirty-six billion paper crowns, a record figure. This resurgence of thrift is all the more remarkable in view of the fact that a portion of the public savings was also absorbed in the subscription to the internal gold loan, which has reached nearly five million dollars.

The visit to Belgrade of Dr. Piepel, the prime minister, has brought about improvement in the relations between Austria and Jugo-Slavia. The many vexatious obstacles to travel between the two countries as well as passport difficulties, are now being removed;

the questions of the sequestration of Austrian property in Jugo-Slavia, and of industrial enterprise in the former Austrian provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina soon will be settled; and the beginning of a new commercial agreement on a large scale seems assured.

## Stealing Secrets by Radio

The members of an important business circle which meets each week to discuss large transactions were mystified recently to find that the results of their deliberations were known to the outside world even during the process of meetings held behind closed doors. For some time no solution of the mystery could be found, but one day a curious belt was seen to have slipped down below the waistcoat of one of their number. He insisted at first that it was a support recommended by his doctor, but eventually he admitted that it was a miniature wireless transmitting set.

The belt contained the necessary batteries arranged like cartridges in a bandolier; the aerial was a long coil of wire stitched into his waistcoat. In his jacket-pocket was a tapping key which worked a muffled buzzer.

The signals sent out by this apparatus were, of course, very weak indeed, but they were easily picked up by a large and extremely sensitive valve receiver situated in an office over the road.

The leakage was explained at once. The offender was ejected minus his body belt—which was kept as a souvenir, and secrecy was at last obtained. —Pearson's Weekly.




