Jimmy Martin's showing was splendid. Back in 1907, Jimmy was up near the front at the finish in a race which was won by the famous Hans Holmér. When he entered the ground on Saturday the crowd gave him a great ovation.

O'Toole was popular with the crowd and many picked him to win next year as he is yet only a boy. Silas McEllan is also a dangerous man and improves as the years roll by. He won a ten mile race at Amherst on Labor Day and appears capable of beating good men.

Harold Yorke, Parrsboro runner, was not in good condition. He suffered with a cold up to a few days before the race and had to take matters easy on the hills.

All prize winners were pleased with the reward for their efforts. It costs quite a penny to run a big race like that of Saturday and the management aims to please.

Jimmy Hawboldt didn't seem to get going. He lacked his usual pep over the ten mile course. He was sixth in his first start three years ago.

George Carey, R.C.R., upheld the reputation of Halifax, being the first local man to cross the line. He was fifth Saturday and sixth the previous year, thus bettering his position by one place.

Young Ray Hamilton made good in his first start and by getting twelfth showed that the youngsters have a chance after all. More young runners are needed and it is up to the clubs to offer encouragement.

John Molver, the only Cape Breton competitor in the race, made a fine showing, getting ninth. He competed in several Boston Marathons and he knows the game.

Frank and Hector Corkum are capable of showing better form than they did Saturday. Last year Frank ran fourth and was booked to do better this year. It looked like a case of brotherly love, the boys staying together too long, as they finished together.

WITNESSES PRODUCTION "NANOOK OF THE NORTH"

His Excellency Sir Wm. Allard and suite were present at the exhibition of "Nanook of the North," the wonderful film which was shown at the Nickel last night. Words are too feeble to do credit to this marvelous film, which stamps itself indelibly on your memory and tugs mightily at your emotions.

"Nanook of the North" is a true, living story of a life that is stark and dramatic; a life that is tragic to civilization but happy and peaceful to the Eskimo, that wonderful race that lives in the frozen vastness at the top of the world. While this film, produced on the East Coast of Hudson Bay by Robert J. Flaherty, F.R.G.S., is a story of the life of an Eskimo family, in some subtle way it unfolds a story full of love and fidelity; danger, thrills and suspense; humor and pathos, and great pictorial beauty.

Mr. Flaherty is an engineer and an explorer; "Nanook of the North" proves him also an artist and a lover of human nature. He makes you love the Eskimo as he does, after years of living with them. The photography is free from the glare and blur that characterizes snow scenes, and a remarkable point is the fact that the film was developed in the Arctic by Mr. Flaherty, in spite of the low temperature and lack of a fully equipped laboratory. Yet it puts to shame other films in its perfection. Some of the Eskimos in the picture learned to assist in the developing and printing. By all means see "Nanook of the North"—you can't afford not to.
