Norwegian and other cures are attracting considerable attention. The Iceland fish cured here is now on sale. A further shipment of 3755 bales of French cod-fish arrived here on the 5th, on the S. S. Duplex. Fortunately the weather has been fairly cool up to the present, but we may expect warm weather at any time in which case inferior qualities will have to be cleared at large reductions. As it is prices of all qualities have fallen and if demand does not improve, the situation will soon become very serious."

**A Half a Ton Fish**

Vancouver, B.C.—How would you feel if you had a fish on the end of your line weighing more than half a ton and reported to be a century old?

That was the recent experience of Patrick Edwards, New Westminster fisherman. He was hauling in his gill net near Silverdale, on the Fraser River, when he felt a terrific pull. Bracing himself against the gunwale of his boat, Edwards prepared for a struggle. The line continued to drag and he could see the lashing of an enormous tail to the rear of his boat; but it was only after a fight of several minutes that the fisherman discovered that a sturgeon had somehow or other plunged into his net. The sturgeon was 12 feet, 6 inches long and weighed 1,015 pounds and valued at \$200. Against this a loss of 135 feet of net had to be met.

If the experts are correct in estimating the age at one hundred years, Mr. Sturgeon was swimming around in the river before the first settlement was built on the Fraser, when the territory was known only to the Indian and the trapper.

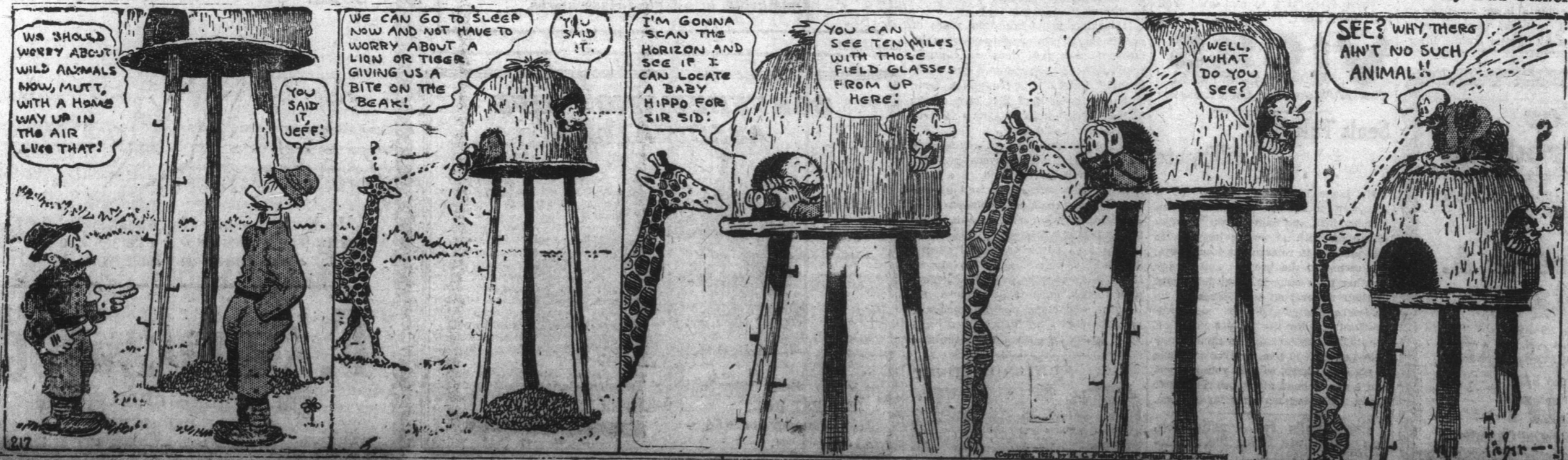
Years ago when the Canadian Pacific Railway was being built to the coast the sturgeon, which according to ancient law was the sole property of the ruling British monarch, was plentiful here and was sold on the Vancouver and New Westminster markets. Now the species is very rare, and is under government protection. Occasionally a big fellow gets caught accidentally, but generally the catch is made by poachers.

It may sound like a fish story, but the biggest sturgeon are often caught by their tails. It is the practice usually followed by Indians, who have a special license to fish sturgeon. The method is to sink a line, along which is baited hooks are strung, about 10 feet from the bottom of a river or stream frequented by sturgeon. The line is strung with hooks facing downstream. The sturgeon works upstream and when they come to the swaying line of hooks they nose partly past the obstruction until the moving tail, their propeller, catches on the hooks. The Indians sometimes use rotted salmon as bait.
