Toronto, April 3.—11 p.m.—A depression of some importance is now central over Lake Superior, and the pressure is high over the Pacific States and along the Atlantic coast. Light falls of snow and rain have occurred in Manitoba, and rain is now falling over portions of the lower lake region.

The General Election

We presume that every man who is now 21 years of age desires to vote at the ensuing general elections for the Province. All whose names are on the voters' lists now, or are placed within the next few days, will be so entitled. The only qualifications are:

1. That the applicant has lived in the Province for twelve months past.
2. That he is living in London now.
3. That he is a British subject.
4. That he is 21 years of age at this date.

Many young men have come of age since the lists were made up. Many persons have moved into the city since last July last. All these can have their names put on the list. They are not there now, and must be put on in the way provided by law. Those qualified as above stated should see the Liberal secretary at the rooms, Oddfellow's Block, any afternoon or evening, and make the necessary arrangements.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mrs. George Wilson, Clarence street, will visit friends in Ettrick for the next two weeks.

—Miss McLachlan, of Hyde Park, left the city this morning via the G. T. R. for Vancouver, B. C.

—Mrs. C. Miers and mother left yesterday for Aymer preparatory to leaving for San Francisco to join Mr. Miers.

—Mr. W. G. Green has returned to St. Thomas after attending the school of infantry in this city and securing a first class certificate.

—County Constable Corsant has made a complaint against John Wyatt, of con. 9, London township, charging him with abusive language. The case will be heard on Tuesday next.

—M. C. R. station agents have been instructed by General Superintendent Miller to enforce the rule not allowing persons not waiting for trains or having business with the company in stations.

—Mr. Howard Weeks, of Cleveland, has been appointed traffic manager of the L. and P. S. R. and of the line of boats to run between Cleveland and Port Stanley. His headquarters are to be in Cleveland.

—The Orient minstrels will put on another show in the East End Hall on Thursday, April 19. This company drew a full house the last time they appeared in the East End, and no doubt will again.

—No less than 54 gentlemen will receive the degree of M. D. C. M. from the University of McGill this year. Messrs. R. Hamilton, Bright, J. F. Kearns and H. E. Fork, Metcalfe, and L. Y. McIntosh, of Strathmore, are among those from Ontario.

—An entertainment was announced to be given to school children yesterday afternoon in the East End town hall, and a large number of school children were on hand at 4:30 to attend. The company, however, could not pay the necessary fee in advance for the use of the hall, and the affair was indefinitely postponed.

—The fire brigade had a run last night to a burning barn at the foot of Clarence street, the property of James Stuart. The place was a regular shell and burnt quickly. What was not destroyed by fire was pulled down by the firemen in pulling out the flames. The loss will not be more than \$50 or \$75. The origin is a mystery.

—Andrew Earl, a well-to-do retired farmer, died in Woodstock recently. It was found that he had made an agreement leaving his estate to the Baptist Church of Canada in return for an annuity during his life. His brothers and sisters now set up the claim that undue influence was used in securing the deed and that the old man was non compos mentis at the time he signed it. They have taken action against Rev. J. H. Scriverby, of Chatham, and Deacon Hoffman, of Thamesville, to whom the property was deeded in trust. The plaintiffs are: Jane McMillan, of London; Wm. Earl, Blandford township; Elizabeth Page, of Pelee; Ken's Editha Lee, of Los Angeles, Cal.; Priscilla Clark, of Victoria; B. C.; Thos. Earl, of East Oxford, and Elizabeth E. George, of Port Elgin.

—Among the members of Christ Church is a poor and deserving widow, who has had a hard time in eking out a living for herself during the winter months. The case was brought to the attention of some of the congregation, who decided to hold a concert for her benefit. It was given last night in the school room, and proved a great success, the place being packed to the doors. Rev. Canon Smith presided. The programme provided was an excellent one, consisting of trios by the Misses Wilson; duets, Misses Wright and Dowell; solos, Misses Case, Goldsmith and Graham, and recitations by Misses Leavelle and H. H. Hinton; guitar selection, Mr. C. Williamson; piano solo, Miss Green; violin solo, Miss McDonald, and club swinging by Mr. T. Partridge, who was accompanied by Mr. Williamson. Votes of thanks were passed to all who took part.

Women's clubs and their benefits—Literary and social clubs and their influence on Canadian literary and social life; musical clubs and associations and their influence on Canadian music; art clubs and associations and their influence on Canadian art.

The relation of parents and children and its responsibilities—Training of infant children; how to retain home influences over grown up boys and girls; difficult children and how to understand them.

Women's work in connection with social reforms—Preventive work; rescue work; temperance work.

Women's work in connection with the sick—Hospital nursing; nursing of the poor in their own homes; emergency, or first aid to the injured, lectures.

The problem of domestic service—From the mistress' point of view and suggested remedies; from the servants' point of view and remedies suggested.
