HUDSON BAY NAVIGATION. Mr. E. Richardson asked: "Has the Government reached any conclusion with regard to sending an expedition to Hudson Bay and Straits to investigate the navigability thereof, with a view of settling beyond peradventure the question of the practicability of the Hudson Bay Railway as a commercial enterprise?"

Mr. Laurier—The Government considers it their duty to have an early date the navigability of Hudson Bay and Straits exhaustively investigated.

PARTISAN OFFICIALS. Mr. Cameron brought up the case of a couple of mail clerks who had absented themselves from their duties to go into West Huron to do election work against him. One of these was John Austin, of the Stratford district, and the other a young man named Dalton, of the London district. They came into the office and canvassed against him, and standing at a church door on Sunday, distributed a scandalous dodger with the intention of injuring his candidature. They were up there both in January and June, 1896. When Mr. Cameron was asked by the Inspector of the Stratford district as to the authority Austin had received leave of absence, the reply was that it was by orders from headquarters. Mr. Cameron moved for the records in the Postoffice Department, and asked that an investigation should be held into their cases and that he should receive their just reward for their offensive partisan conduct.

Mr. Laurier took occasion to call attention to a similar case in which a mail clerk who received leave of absence and spent the time in electioneering in Hamilton. He said that there seemed to have been an organized effort on the part of the late Government to give leave of absence to all the officials who could do election service for them.

Mr. Mulock, Postmaster-General, replied that there had been a number of complaints of this kind, and that he would be glad to investigate and justice done in every case.

Mr. Choquette asked what the Postmaster-General would do with postmasters who had prostituted their office by accepting bags of election literature in violation of the law, and had used their offices for the distribution of "dirty sheets."

The House smiled in an amused way at Mr. Choquette's strong language.

Mr. Speaker suggested that the discussion was likely to go far afield if these questions were permitted.

Mr. Laurier, rising, said he had no objection to answering the question. "Anybody," he remarked with a smile, "who has distributed dirty sheets or blanketed has acted as an offensive partisan." (Laughter.)

Mr. Choquette asked whether it would be necessary to hold an investigation into these cases, or would the statement of the sitting member be sufficient, to cut off the heads of the "dirty sheets."

There was no reply to the question.

BRITISH COLUMBIA MINES. Mr. Bostock, the young member for Yale-Caribou, brought to the House's attention the mining development of British Columbia. He moved, "That in the opinion of this House it will be in the interests of immigration and the development of the Dominion that the Government should collect through the Department of Agriculture all the information possible with respect to the mining interests of British Columbia and the other provinces of the Dominion and distribute it."

He made a strong speech. It was full of glowing reports of the resources of the country, and the necessity for developing them.

HOPE OF THE COUNTRY. Mr. Laurier had no hesitation in saying that the mining development of British Columbia was the hope of the country. All looked to the hope of the country to attract immigration from abroad.

He showed what the geological survey was doing in the way of collecting statistics, and said that as to the practice of speculators in placing their bets on the future of the country, that was an old story.

He did not know whether the present law was adequate to meet such a case, but the opinion of the Minister of Justice would be obtained as to this, and if at the next session the Minister reported that the present law was not sufficient to cover such cases then the Government would have the criminal law amended in that direction.

NOTES. The St. Clair and Erie Ship Canal Company has been granted by the Government at Ottawa an extension of time of two years for the commencing, and five years for the completion, of their work.

The Supreme Court will open its regular fall sitting the second week in October. Mr. Justice Taschereau has obtained leave, and will therefore, not occupy a seat on the bench. Mr. Justice Gwynne has been away all summer, but will have arrived to the effect that he will be on hand for the opening of the court, sailing from Europe today. Of the other four Supreme Court judges, the Chief Justice and Justice Groulx are here, and Justices Sedgewick and King will be

on hand. There may be a quorum, therefore.

Sir Oliver Mowat's bill to appoint ad hoc judges for the Supreme Court, to fill temporary vacancies, was read a second time in the Senate yesterday.
