London, Sept. 17.—Wm. H. Brutal Brigands.

London, Sept. 18.—The British consul at Palermo, in a report to the Foreign Office, gives startling details of the operation of brigands in Sicily. The band led by Samu is the most formidable, and the most numerous. They have committed many murders, characterized by the greatest cruelty. They have beheaded little boys and girls, and their bodies in halves and then thrown the remains about the country for dogs to devour. Many landowners who have incurred the enmity of the brigands have been treacherously assassinated, while others who have fallen into their hands have been condemned to death by slow torture.

Louis Kossuth's Ninetieth Birthday.

FESTIVITIES. Sept. 18.—The 90th anniversary of the birth of Louis Kossuth, the Hungarian patriot, was fittingly celebrated in this city to-day. The festivity opened with a procession in which several thousand persons took part. After passing the principal streets, the procession went to the park, where speeches and recitations were made glorifying Kossuth. A congratulatory telegram was sent to Kossuth and also one to the Hungarian colony. A delegation of the Hungarian colony presented an address to Kossuth in Turin to-day.

Where Royalty's Trousers Are Made.

London, Sept. 18.—Miss H. C. C., a working tailor's daughter, told the Trades Union Congress that she knew a fever den in London, where the Duke of York's trousers were made, and that she sewed trousers herself next door. This statement, which was made as an attack on the sweating system, has been taken up by the press, and has caused a great deal of amusement. The Duke of York's trousers are made in a great factory which employs many men, which largely supplies America, and which is kept in good sanitary condition. But Miss H. C. C. was right in saying that high prices paid the sweating tailors for the production of garments in fever dens.

Collapse of Seven London Clubs.

London, Sept. 17.—Land and Water declares that a financial crisis which first found serious expression in the Baring collapse is becoming more acute. The situation is rendered worse by the artificial efforts made during the past two years to postpone the inevitable result. Within the past 24 hours seven clubs in the West End have been indefinitely closed, and half the London journals are at the verge of disaster. Five of the largest estates in England are shortly to be sold. Several commercial firms of hitherto good reputation are now distressed and the number of well known men prominent as society contributors is vanishing. The writer declares the collapse of the Lyric Club, one of the "smartest" in England, with an aristocratic and wealthy membership. This club was seemingly highly prosperous and most of the directors were wealthy. It was an extremely profitable concern. London, Sept. 19.—Sir Arthur Sullivan has recovered sufficiently to warrant hopes that he will personally conduct the Sullivan-Grundy opera, "Haddon Hall," in the Savoy Theatre on next Saturday. The production excites the liveliest interest in theatrical and musical circles and among the opera-going public.

Emin Pasha in the Power of Arabs.

Berlin, Sept. 19.—Dr. Stuhlman, writing from Tabora, repeats that Emin Pasha is within the power of the Arabs at the south end of Albert Edward Nyanza waiting for assistance to escape. The Arab revolts in the Congo State is spreading to German territory.

Matrimonial Swindles.

Paris, Sept. 19.—The matrimonial swindle continues to flourish here. A family of four—father, mother, son and daughter, are at length in jail, after fleeing no less than 3,000 would-be husbands in search of rich brides. They advertised in the best newspapers, and the responses came in hundreds. They required first 20 francs registration fee, a similar fee for a mere glimpse of the fair one, and more exorbitant payments for greater privileges. After their arrest 600 letters, nearly all containing money, were found addressed to the swindlers in the postoffice.

Among the Players.

London, Sept. 19.—The critics unanimously condemn Mrs. Langtry's new play, "The Queen of Manoa." The Standard describes it as the bad dream of an unsuccessful matinee, and the best thing said of it made it "a triumph of millinery and diamonds." It will live until the curiosity of women over Mrs. Langtry's four magnificent gowns has been satisfied. Miss Ellen Terry's illness is not serious, but it may delay her appearance as "Catherine" with Mr. Irving for some time. This is the second attack from influenza that Miss Terry has suffered this year.

A Clergyman's Downfall.

London, Sept. 19.—The Rev. Joseph Weedon, vicar of Moreton parish, in Lancashire, committed suicide at Rhyll, a watering place in Wales, Saturday morning. Weedon was considered to be a man of exceptional piety, and was happily married. A fortnight ago, when he started on his vacation, he behaved strangely toward his wife, and finally told her that he would have to leave her at home as he did not have money enough to pay the board of two persons. Mrs. Weedon stayed at home.

Mr. Weedon met a pretty young servant girl from Moreton at a station a few miles off, and proceeded with her to Rhyll, where he introduced her at the hotel as his wife. The couple lived so extravagantly that when the bill was presented on Thursday night Weedon was unable to pay it. The landlord threatened proceedings, but Mr. Weedon held him off with promises to raise the money. On the next morning Weedon bought a revolver, went to the hotel, and shot himself dead. The coroner's jury to-day gave a verdict of suicide in a fit of insanity.

The Cholera Situation in Europe Improved.

Decrease of the Disease in Hamburg and in Russia.

No New Cases Reported in New York City.

Steps Taken to Fight the Plague in Ontario—Inspection, Disinfection, Isolation—Record of New Cases and Deaths in Various European Cities.

ACTION OF THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT.

The Dominion Customs Department has issued a telegram to collectors of customs, instructing them to exercise the greatest possible vigilance in order to locate any suspicious articles in which infection may exist which may be imported from infected localities in the United States.

An extra of the Canada Gazette contains the proclamation of a quarantine on the Canadian border against passengers and merchandise from the city of New York. Similar precautions have been adopted in the West Indies.

THE SITUATION IN EUROPE.

New York, Sept. 18.—The following is the cholera situation in Europe to-day as gathered from a large number of cables and papers received this evening. At St. Petersburg there were 50 fresh cases and 15 deaths; at Havre 6 new cases and 3 deaths; at St. Petersburg 41 cases and 15 deaths. The disease seems to be steadily decreasing throughout Russia.

Berlin had another case yesterday, that of a waiter who had formerly been employed at Hamburg there were 236 fresh cases and 127 deaths reported yesterday. These figures, however, include 60 fresh cases and 40 deaths which occurred on previous days, thus showing a decrease both in the number of patients and the mortality.

A fact showing the return of confidence on part of people is that several cases were given in the St. Pauli garden this afternoon for the first time in several weeks. The steamship Servia which sailed from Hamburg for New York to-day carried 539 passengers and 24 second cabin passengers.

The steamer was empty. The Arizona had sailed with empty steerage. She had 157 saloon and 236 second cabin passengers on board. The Queenstown authorities announced that henceforth until all danger of cholera infection has ceased, a doctor will board all the American liners arriving at Queenstown from ports in the United States, and if any sickness is found on a steamer the vessel must be placed in quarantine before any of the passengers are allowed to disembark. Otherwise the steamer must proceed direct for Liverpool, only communicating with Queenstown for

purpose of procuring the services of a pilot. When the steamer Appleton, from Newcastle, arrived at Queenstown to-day it was found by the health officials that a seaman on board the vessel was suffering from a choleric disorder. The doctors who have examined the patient do not believe that the disease is of the Asiatic type.

BLUFF!

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The Board of Health of Islip, L. I., on Saturday adopted a resolution directing the sheriff of the county to take possession of Fire Island, to eject all passengers and baggage and to prevent landing of anyone. He was authorized to call upon the entire force of the county to carry this into effect. Governor Flower, on being informed of this state of affairs, at once telegraphed as follows: "The town of Islip Board of Health has no quarantine line established by Dr. Jenkins, health officer, against all trespassers. If you need more men call on Adj. Gen. Porter. ROSWELL P. FLOWER."

NO NEW CASES IN NEW YORK CITY.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The Board of Health issued a bulletin to-day in which it was stated that no cases of suspected cases of cholera had appeared since the last bulletin, and no deaths from cholera had occurred since Tuesday.

NO TROUBLE AT FIRE ISLAND.

The steamer Cyprian landed the 325 Cuban passengers of the steamship Wyoming at Fire Island this afternoon. Not the slightest opposition was offered by the Islip health authorities or baymen. In fact not one of either was to be seen afloat or ashore. No sickness was reported.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The only death to-day at quarantine reported was that of a child on board the Scandia who died of marasmus. There were no new cases and no deaths on board any of the ships or on the islands, and it would appear that the cholera spectre is now safely defeated.

Sept. 18.—(Midnight)—The British steamer Washington City, from Hamburg Aug. 27, arrived in quarantine at 10:18 p.m. She will be closely inspected. She put into St. Johns, Nfld., Sept. 12 for coal.

THE DEATH ROLL.

St. Petersburg, Friday 48 new cases of cholera and 15 deaths. This is 11 less cases and 7 more deaths than were reported Thursday. Sixty cholera patients were discharged to the hospitals Friday, they having recovered.

HAMBURG.—Official cholera statistics for Friday: New cases, 276; deaths, 130. HAVRE.—Three new cases of cholera and five deaths were reported here to-day.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 19.—There were only twelve new cases of cholera reported in this city yesterday, a decrease of 29 compared with the figures of Saturday. There were 32 deaths, an increase of 17. Sixty-five patients were discharged from the hospitals to-day.

HAMBURG, Sept. 19.—Yesterday 109 cases of cholera were reported, and 45 deaths, a decrease of 17 cases and 2 deaths compared with Saturday. The rate of removals to the hospitals are decreasing. The total returns up to Saturday give the number of persons attacked by cholera as 15,063, and deaths as 6,764.

SOWING AND REAPING.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 19.—The ignorant Russian workers in now reaping the fruit of their foolish attempts to prevent proper sanitary measures being taken to check the spread of cholera. Riots have occurred at Hughesofka, in the Government of Ekaterinoslav, and in their blind fanaticism they have destroyed factories and shops.

There is a great distress in the town and hundreds of the inhabitants are on the verge of starvation. They have been compelled by hunger to eat of all manner of refuse, with the result that cholera is now raging among them worse than before. The disease is now spreading to the suburbs, and the workers who are able to do so are leaving the place.

TO FIGHT CHOLERA IN ONTARIO.

TORONTO, Sept. 18.—At the conference between the Provincial Board of Health and the Ontario Government it was decided to fight cholera in Ontario by inspection, disinfection and isolation, and not by attempted quarantine. Inspectors will be appointed at Fort Erie, Kingston, Suspension Bridge and Niagara, and at the latter station a disinfecting apparatus will be erected similar to that at New York. In this way the Government hope to keep cholera out without injury to business.

AMONG THE STEAMERS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—The big liner Fuerst Bismarck came over the bar yesterday morning, clean as a hound's tooth of cholera germs. She had no steerage passengers, but she carried 447 cabin passengers, all of whom are well.

The Canadian Eturia has been boarded and all were found to be well. She has 563 first and 75 second cabin passengers and no steerage.

The Monarca, of London, came in with all well aboard.

Every one of the Scandia's 1,000 passengers will be rechecked and then transferred to Camp Low. Their own clothing will be disinfected and returned to them before they are discharged.

The Monarca, the pioneer of the cholera ships, will be released in a few days. The Russia's cabin passengers are now very comfortably housed on board the New Hampshire and her steerage passengers are on Hoffman Island. The steerage passengers of the Normannia will be sent to Sandy Hook Monday.

There are nearly 4,000 souls detained down the bay, and a fleet of ships are at anchor, the Bothnia, Suevia and City of Chester having been added.

The public's interest in cholera news is growing less and less, and the morning papers to-day are pushing cholera news along to make room in the display columns for fresher matter. The people have lost the nervous apprehension that at the outset prevailed. The utmost vigor and vigilance are being exercised officially, and the public seems not disposed to shoulder anxieties that are being borne to their satisfaction by the authorities.

NO NEW CASES IN NEW YORK.

The New York Board of Health reports no cholera has appeared in the city since the last bulletin.

THE YELLOW FLAG.

QUARANTINE, NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—There are no new developments in the Quarantine situation this morning. The steamship Farnesia arrived this morning from Glasgow and reported all well.

THE DARING SKY-SURFERS.

Mrs. Mandell, the sky-surfer, arrived Saturday, accompanied by her manager, Charles Little, the latter's wife, and his male assistant. They set to work on the ground, unpacked the big balloon and the rubber-strap from which the hot air is secured, and got everything in readiness for the first ascension to-day.

"I have been in this business fifteen years," said Mr. Little to a reporter, "and have had been no accidents under my management yet. I have made many ascensions myself, but not in late years. Danger? Yes, certainly there is danger in it, but no more than in anything else if you are careful. There have been lots of accidents I know, but you trace the cause and you find out that in every case it was due to some carelessness. The fact is there are too many second-rate people in the business, ready to take a contract for almost nothing. They have had no experience and generally come to a sad end. My young assistant here is an expert. He has made 25 ascensions in the last season already. We came here from Ohio."

Mrs. Mandell is a good-looking blonde and has a complexion of short, curly hair.

"I have been with Mr. Little a couple of ascensions," she said, "and have gone up a good deal in that time. I never met with a mishap. Afraid? Oh, no; one gets used to it. Of course you never know where you are going to alight."

Mrs. Mandell will make five ascensions each on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. She has a strange partner on these aerial voyages—her dog Aerio. This intelligent canine goes up in the same balloon, and makes the descent in a separate parachute holding on by his teeth.

THE STAPLES DISASTER.

Thousands of Sight-Seers Visit the Scene.

Corrected List of the Injured—Burial of the Dead.

LEAMINGTON, Ont., Sept. 18.—Two boilers, not one, exploded in the stove mill of Messrs. Force & Dickson at Staples on Saturday morning. The mill was one of the largest in Staples and employed 40 men. Dr. Abbott, the efficient coroner, opened an inquest and after viewing the bodies adjourned until Tuesday.

THOUSANDS OF SIGHT-SEERS.

All day vast crowds have come from all quarters to view the scene of the explosion including representatives of the Toronto press. There were on one time July 4,000 people in the millyard.

Nothing new can be learned regarding the cause of the accident. In an interview with the engineer a reporter was informed that there was very little steam in the boilers at the time of the accident, that he had just put in more fuel and was on his way to the engine room to start the engine.

SAD SCENES.

Mr. N. Chauvin, the engineer, is a man of strong nerve. He spoke clearly and positively. In one corner of the room lay a body that was mortal of his two sons in rowed coffins, while Mr. Chauvin, step-mother of the boys, lay in an adjoining room in a precarious condition. The shock was too great for her, and it is doubtful whether she will recover. Isai Boone, the man who was fatally injured, is very low, and his death may occur at any time.

CONGREGATION OF THE INJURED.

The following is a correct list of those who were injured: Nicholas Chauvin, engineer; MacGillies, teamster, and A. Shelton, C. Chauvin, John Rilly, V. Tassier, Chris. Riberdie, all mill hands, and all of whom will recover.

THE FUNERAL OF MR. JOSEPH PAPINEAU, one of the unfortunates, took place at 9 o'clock this morning. He was connected with the Methodist Church and the services were under the direction of that body. His remains were interred in the cemetery on the 9th concession of Merens township.

At 2 p.m. the funeral of the late John Ewing took place. The Orangemen, of which order he was a member, attended in a body. His remains were taken to Cottam Cemetery, about four miles from Essex Center.

THE BODIES OF MICHAEL DUPUIS, Peter Dault and Maiz Oullette will be interred in the Roman Catholic Cemetery, St. Joachim, about ten miles distant, while the Chauvin brothers will be buried in the Roman Catholic Cemetery at Stoney Point.

REDUCED TO ASHES.

BROOKLYN, Sept. 18.—A disastrous fire broke out yesterday morning in the three-story wooden extension of the machine shop in the navy yard. In this extension was stored the machinery of the
