Toronto, Ont., Aug. 24, 11 p.m.—This
evening's weather chart has been very
much the same appearance as that for
last night, the trough of low pressure
still existing from the Western States
across the Lake region to the Mar-
time Provinces. Present indications
point to a continuance of unsettled
weather, and while there will be no
general rain, there will be numerous
local showers between Ontario and the
Maritime provinces. The highest tem-
peratures reported today were 92 at
Kamloops, 84 at Edmonton and 83 at
Toronto. Minimum and maximum
temperatures: Victoria, 52-82; Prince
Albert, 52-66; Qu'Appelle, 50-68; Win-
nipeg, 52-76; Port Arthur, 50-56;
Perry Sound, 62-83; Toronto, 70-83;
Ottawa, 60-68; Montreal, 60-86; Que-
bec, 58-70; Halifax, 60-78.
Toronto, Aug. 25, 1 a.m.—Lower
Jakes—Light to moderate winds; part-
ly fair, local showers.
Local temperatures—The highest and
lowest readings of the thermometer at
the observatory on Wednesday were
75.5 and 67 above.

DIVINE HEALERS

Rev. Robert Johnston Discusses
Their Methods.

How Schrader, Dr. Dowd and Others
Work—Sometimes Cure by Chang-
ing the Imagination.

"Divine Healing and Healers" was
the subject of Rev. Robert Johnston's
discourse at the weekly prayer meeting
last night. In his introductory re-
marks the preacher opined that we, in
the last of the nineteenth century,
should be the least dogmatical as to
what is and is not true. A German
mathematician was now contending
that space had a fourth dimension—
height, breadth, length, and a fourth.
Who was to say that it had not? He
had been led to take up the subject
of divine healers because he had been
asked so many times about them. Mr.
Johnston was acquainted with persons
in this city who claimed to have been
raised up to health and strength by
resorting to prayer, after they had doc-
tored in vain for years. They thought
it a fuller faith in God to decline the
doctor's medicine. He referred to the
shrines at St. Anne de Beaupre and of
Our Lady of Lourdes, France, where
heaps of cures were effected. Artificial
limbs, medicine bottles and what not
had been left by persons whom he be-
