Rev. Robert Johnston Discusses Their Methods.

How Schrader, Dr. Dowil and Others Work-Sometimes Cure by Changing the Imagination.

"Divine Healing and Healers" was

the subject of Rev. Robert Johnston's discourse at the weekly prayer meeting last night. In his introductory remarks the preacher opined that we, in the last of the nineteenth century, should be the least dogmatical as to should be the least dogmatical as to what is and is not true. A German mathematician was now contending that space had a fourth dimensionheight, breadth, length, and a fourth. Who was to say that it had not? He had been led to take up the subject of divine healers because he had been asked so many times about them. Mr. Johnston was acquainted with persons in this city who claimed to have been raised up to health and strength by resorting to prayer, after they had doc tored in vain for years. They thought it a fuller faith in God to decline the doctor's medicine. He referred to the shrines at St. Anne de Beaupre and of Our Lady of Lourdes, France, where heaps of crutches, glasses, artificial limbs, medicine bottles and what not had been left by persons whom he believed had been healed beyond a doubt. The speaker would not say that Dr. Dowie, Mr. Schrader, Dr. Cullis and Dr. Wier Mitchell had not healed some people. Dr. Dowie's hotel and tabernacle in Chicago were described. The hotel was for guests who came to be healed. The tabernacle was a large building, around the walls of which were thousands of crutches, glasses, medicine bottles, invalids' chairs and other articles, blended into all manner of fantastical shapes. Dr. Dowie was formerly a Congregationalist minister in Australia. He preached the doctrine that when Christ took upon himself the redemption of our souls through his blood, he also took upon himself the redemption of the body from suffering. The preaching sometimes in Dr. Dowie's tabernacle was such as would not be tolerated here, even in a respectable hotel, let alone a church. In dealing with Mr. Schrader, the speaker said he had been unable to find a solitary instance where a cure, or even relief, had been effected. Mr. Schrader believed he had the healing power, and in going round healing people Mr. Schrader thought he was doing as much to advance the kingdom of God as any other man. Schrader claimed his power was the same as the gift of music or of eloquence. Mr. Johnston told of a young man who had gone to Schrader. latter placed his hands on him, looked heavenward as though in prayer, and then the man's handkerchief blessed in a similar way. The sick man was requested to call again that evening, and he did so, taking Mr. Johnston along. Schrader asked his patient if he was any better. The reply was "No." Then followed the question, "Are usatisfied with your own condition?" "No," was the answer of the patient. MR. SALLMON'S TOUR

Distinctively English and Scotch Cities of New Zealand.

The Cold Lake Region-Beautiful Scenery-A Rough Voyage.


The following is the last of the present series of New Zealand letters from Mr. W. H. Sallmon, B.A., of this city. "Another day's journey over a private railway, with cars after the American plan, and a good dining-car, brings one to the last city of the North WELLINGTON, THE CAPITAL

of New Zealand. It is a bustling com-

mercial center. The Canadian line of steamers from Vancouver to Sydney make this a point of call. The city is built on many hills, and the structures are chiefly of wood, on account of frequent earthquake shocks. The parliament buildings are said to be the largest wooden buildings in the world. The tone of society is so distant and frigid that General Booth is said to have remarked that the two occasions on which he felt the chilliest were when he was nearest to the north pole and when in Wellington, N. Z. Other visitors have noticed the same feature. "A few hours by steamer brings the traveler to the pretty city of Nelson, of which Max O'Rell wrote: 'A gem, an idyll, a miniature Arcadia, a sleeping beauty.' During the summer many tourists proceed from here by coach through the fine scenery of the Otira and Buller Gorges. The other route is by steamer, back to Wellington, thence by sea to Lyttelton, the port of Christchurch. By tunneling through a range of hills, the Canterbury Plains are reached, and here the city is built. It is an English town, founded by English settlers, and dominated by English customs. There is a magnificent cathedral and substantial college and school buildings, all of stone.

"From this point the railway runs to the extremity of the island, so that one has the choice of sea or land in proceeding southwards. It is a day's journey to Dunedin, and en route there are several promising towns, notably Timarn and Oamaru. The names would signify a Maori population, but there are few Maoris left in the South Island -probably not more than 2,000 out of the entire native population of the col-

as its name signifies (the former name for Edinburgh) is a Scotch settlement, as distinctly Scotch as Christchurch is English. It was founded only fifty years ago by the Rev. Thomas Burns. and a monument stands to his memory in one of the principal squares, faced

Here the steamer proceeds to Queenstown, a village beautifully situated in view of Ben Lomond, Mounts Cecil and Albert, and The Remarkables. From the head of the lake 25 miles farther on, Mount Earnslaw raises his snow-capped peak, and many other ranges and lakes are in sight.
