Within Pekin's

"Sacred City"

Capture Participated in by 4,000 Native Christians.

Street Fighting Continues—Whereabouts of the Imperial

Entourage Not Clearly Ascertained—Pekin Envoys

En Route to Tien Tsin—Legations Relieved

None Too Soon.

London, Wednesday, Aug. 22—4 a.m. The foreign envoys, according to the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, are proceeding to Tien Tsin. The same correspondent avers that the sacred city was entered Aug. 15, two days earlier than Rear Admiral Bruce reported. "The flags of the allies," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Mail, wiring yesterday, "are now floating over the imperial palace. Street fighting, however, continues. Considerable assistance in the capture of Pekin was rendered by 4,000 armed native Christians. The legations were enabled to hold out by purchasing ammunition from the Chinese."

FIGHTING ON SATURDAY.

Fighting was going on at Pekin Saturday, according to one report, but according to the following dispatch received by the admiralty from Rear Admiral Bruce, the allies entered the sacred city of Pekin Friday:

"Pekin, Aug. 19, Sunday. The allies are reported to have entered the sacred city of Pekin, Aug. 17."

RELIEVED NONE TOO SOON.

Pekin, Aug. 14, via Chefoo, Aug. 21. The American and Russian flags were planted on the east wall at 11 o'clock this morning. The Indian troops entered the British legation at 1 and the Americans at 3. There was a joyful reception from the wall. The allied troops could have lasted but a little longer. They had only three days' rations.

The Chinese had been attacking furiously for three days. Four thousand shells fell in the legation during the siege. Sixty-five were killed and 180 wounded.

The Japanese began the battle before daylight, and they are still fighting about the north wall, where a part of the Chinese are defying the imperial city. The Japanese casualties have not yet been ascertained. The Russians had five killed and twelve wounded. The Americans and British had a few wounded.

The plan was to make a general attack tomorrow, and the troops were arriving at camp, five miles east, all night. They were completely exhausted, and slept in the corn-fields in the rain.

PUSHED ON.

The generals, however, alarmed at the sounds of a heavy attack on the legations, pushed forward independent combats. The British, Americans and French on the left of the river and the Russian and Japanese on the right. Beginning at 2 o'clock this morning, the Japanese diverted the brunt of the resistance to the northern city, their artillery engaging the Chinese heavily there.

The Americans and British met with but little resistance until they entered the city, where there was street fighting. Reilly's battery attempted to breach the inner wall. The troops finally entered the city through the canal. The Chinese had continually violated the armistice.

WHERE IS SHE?

London, Aug. 22.—In the news that reaches London this morning direct from China, there is nothing to confirm the report that the empress dowager has been run to earth.

Diverse paragraphs as to the movements of the Chinese imperial family continue to be received at the treaty ports, and are thence faithfully transmitted to the European capitals. Those representing the court as having left Pekin are of exclusive Chinese origin. According to them, their majesties are well on their way from Sian Fu, about 500 miles distant. If the Chinese government is at Sian Fu there is no means of getting at them, according to the military men, without a prolonged campaign, and with an army as large as Lord Roberts' to secure the bases of communication.

Washington, Aug. 21.—The government has received positive confirmation from the official Chinese sources of the departure of the emperor and empress dowager, westward, from Pekin. Where they are now is not stated.

THE TIEN TSEN FIGHT.

New York, Aug. 21.—Dr. P. G. Smith, a medical missionary of the London Mission, who was attached to the hospital at Tien Tsin, arrived in the city today on his way to England. The fighting began on June 17. On the 19th, he said, the Chinese could easily have overwhelmed the foreign settlement if they had attacked the Manchou college. The foreign troops then numbered not much over 2,000, and that part of the line of defense was left unoccupied. Dr. Smith also said: "I have seen it stated that the allies began the attack, but that is incorrect. The allies sent an ultimatum, demanding the surrender of the Manchou college by 3 p.m. on June 17. At 2:30 the Chinese opened fire. They fired at Gordon Hall, where they knew the women and children were gathered. The first shot struck the building, but low down, and the Chinese could not see it. Then they elevated the gun, and did not get the range again that day. The Chinese got information from spies all the time. Some spies even let carrier pigeons loose from the foreign hospital. The hospital was injured at all, although shells struck all around us. We prayed that none of the wounded in the hospital should be hit, and none of them were."

NO QUARTER.

Berlin, Aug. 21.—Great attention has been attracted by an interview published here in the Frankfurter Zeitung, between that paper's correspondent at Tokio and Lieut. Von Krohn, who was wounded in Admiral Seymour's expedition. Lieut. Von Krohn says: "At the beginning wounded Boxers were sent to the hospitals at Tien Tsin, but it was seen later that this was a mistake. Hence an order was given to kill all Chinese who stand, not even to spare the wounded, but particularly to take absolutely no prisoners alive."
