SQUABBLES ARE TO BE AVOIDED

Board of Works Deals With a Pavement Matter.

IS ANXIOUS FOR COMPETITION
And Will Not Tie Itself to Any One Company—Park Commissioner's Suggestion.

In dealing with the petition of the Machinery Manufacturing Company and others for an asphalt pavement on Wellington street between Dundas street and the G. T. R., the board of works last night took such action as will leave no room for tangles and squabbles such as those experienced in regard to the King street roadway. The wise course adopted by the board was to call for tenders for asphalt blocks, and also for ordinary asphalt, of any class, so that the people will be at liberty to accept any tender submitted. This conclusion was arrived at after it was shown that there was only one firm in Canada that made asphalt blocks, and the aldermen did not care to tie themselves up hand and foot to any company. In order that no complications might arise in any particular, it was also decided to allow the petition to lay over for a while, but this does not interfere with calling for the tenders.

Park Commissioner Pearce presented a communication, which he fully explained regarding a city nursery at Springbank. In brief, he proposed to buy 16,450 trees, from Pierre Labrie & Sons, of Ussy, Calvados, France, and to place them in nurseries at Springbank, and use them as required to beautify the parks of the city, and also the lawns and grounds of public buildings.

The committee thought very well of the proposition, but as there were no tenders was decided to take no action upon it, but to send it on to the council.

George Peters asked for permission to put an electric sign in front of his confectionery on Richmond street, and the committee decided to recommend that the request be granted.

The pay sheet for the week amounted to \$122.

Chairman Wyatt, Ald. Cooper, Gerry and Abram and Secretary Bell were present.

The school is in a flourishing condition, the membership being on the increase. The treasurer has considerable funds on hand, and it has been decided to use a portion of them towards carpeting and improving the infant class room.

IS STILL IN JAIL
W. A. McDougall in Custody at Montreal on a Capias.

Wm. A. McDougall, the former London wholesale merchant, recently acquitted at Montreal on a charge of retaining a large amount of goods by false pretenses, is still in jail on a capias issued at the instance of Herrmann H. Wolff & Co., of that city. The case came up in the court of review at Montreal this week, when Mr. S. W. Jacobs, for Wolff & Co., argued that McDougall had by his own admission sold his entire stock at 40 and 50 per cent less than the cost price, and paid a former partner and other creditors to the prejudice of the plaintiffs and a number of other Montreal merchants. This, it was argued, constituted a preference by McDougall, and in the eye of the law made the debtor liable for retention of his property. Mr. A. R. McMaster, for McDougall, denied that his client was guilty of any fraudulent intent, in making the payments complained of, and argued that his client acted in good faith in all his transactions. He claimed that McDougall was obliged to assign through illness, which was responsible for his present troubles.

The court, consisting of Judges Tassereau, Mathieu and Loranger, intimated that a decision will be rendered at an early date, seeing that McDougall is in jail. Their lordships stated that the legal question involved was one of great interest to the commercial public.

INSURED FOR \$1,000,000
American Floating Dock Insured With London Firm.

London, Nov. 26. — The new floating dock, which is to be built at Baltimore for the use of the vessels of the United States navy at Cavite has been insured in London for a sum approximating three-quarters of its value, which will be about \$1,000,000. The insurance was placed by Willis Faber & Co., one of the biggest marine insurance firms in Lloyd's, though the insurance is hardly of a marine nature, consisting only of what is called builders' risks. This covers all risk from the time the construction is begun until the big shell is finished, except for the risk of launching. The principal danger will be from fire, hence the premium is small as compared with the rate paid for vessels subject to perils at sea.

This is one of the largest insurances ever effected on a floating dock and though the underwriters' risk does not reach the total sum insured until the dock is finished. The Havana Dry Dock Company's floating dock is insured here for \$300,000, and the new pontoon dock now under tow for Port Natal, which is valued at \$500,000, also is insured in London.

ARRIVED AT BOSTON.
A Boston dispatch chronicles the arrival in that city of an automobile party, comprising Mrs. S. E. York, Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Howard and Jack Elliott, of Minneapolis, which passed through this city about three weeks ago. Mr. Elliott is well-known in London, where he has relatives. The party are making a tour from St. Paul to Portland, Me., and thence to St. Louis. They left St. Paul in an eighteen-horse power, single cylinder motor car, which they named Minneapolis, four weeks ago last Saturday, and have come along by easy stages. They have had a pleasant trip all the way with but few drawbacks. The route to St. Louis will be via Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington and the Southern States. The party is planning to eat a Christmas dinner in St. Louis.
