So Say Crossley and Hunter of Their Loss in the Atlas Loan Company's Crash.

Crossley and Hunter, the evangelists, have issued a campaign at Brighton, and following their custom in other places, have issued a statement to the townspeople. In it they say:

"The year has been one of the most peaceful and joyous in our history; but many ask us, 'Have you not lost heavily by the failure of the Atlas Loan and Loan Company?' Oh, yes, we have, but the few thousand dollars we have lost for a rainy day, and in addition to this, we have lost the honor and respect of the community, we were held liable for an unlimited number of dollars more for unpaid shares. These shares were never intended by the company to be paid, but few persons now regard the payment as a moral obligation; nevertheless, Mr. Hunter will mortgage his home to pay his assessment, and Mr. Crossley has borrowed money to redeem his Muskoka property and insurance from the unreasonable demand made by the company."

"But even in this financial loss we have found great occasion for gratitude and joy. We are thankful that what is gone is only skim milk, as we have given away the cream; for, say we, nothing but the cream of religion had the joy of distributing to religious and benevolent objects more than \$12,000 during the last seven years, or just about the amount we had laid by in 20 years."

"Next to the favor of God we gratefully appreciate the abiding confidence of the people, and this we have, for they know that, though the Atlas was wrecked by the management violating the charter, not the shadow of a questionable practice has been ours from time to time, as the shares we held were not speculative or margin stock, but purely ordinary stock, similar to shares in any chartered bank or industrial institution."

LIGHTNING CAME THROUGH WINDOW

Charles Ellah, of Downie, Had a Close Call—His House Badly Demoralized.

St. Marys, July 12.—One of the severest electrical storms of the season, accompanied by very loud claps of thunder and heavy downpour of rain, passed over St. Marys shortly after a clock yesterday morning. Charles Ellah, a young farmer and Downie, was struck by lightning, with the result that his lower limbs are paralyzed and badly burned by the electric fluid. He resides on lot 15, con. 10, Downie, on the central gravel road, about five miles from St. Marys. When the storm was at its height, he, being affected with asthma, had got up and was near the window, when a flash of lightning came through and struck his lower extremities. Simultaneously an electric bolt came through the chimney, the furniture in every room in the house, excepting one, was upset. In one room, where some of his children slept, a part of the ceiling was knocked down, but the carpet tipped up and also a portion of the floor. Mr. Brown, of St. Marys, who was called in to attend to Mr. Ellah for over four hours, is suffering much pain from the burns, but the doctor has hopes of his full recovery.

WESTERN PACKING HOUSES TIED UP

Kansas City, July 12. — Eight thousand and meat cutters, butchers and others connected with the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen's Union, constituting in the six big packing plants here, struck today, in obedience to President Donnelly's order of yesterday, calling the men out. All the plants are shut down, and 12,000 men are out of work.

The strike of the meat cutters and butchers is affecting the supply of meat in the city.

Chicago, July 12. — Promptly on time the general strike began. Schwartz, Cuts and Salsberger, the National Packing Company, and a number of minor plants were at once affected. It was said that the last of the men would be out in the various larger plants until perhaps 10:30 tonight.

The total number who had already quit work was estimated at 15,000. Word was received that 5,000 men had quit at East St. Louis, and 1,000 at Chicago. One hundred girls employed in the label department of Nelson Morris Company, struck with the men.

Oman, Neb., July 12.—At noon today 4,000 employees of the four packing houses at South Omaha laid down their tools and went on strike. The packing plants affected are those of Armour, Swift, Cudahy and the Omaha Packing Company.

St. Joseph, Mo., July 12.—More than 5,000 employees of Swift & Co., Nelson Morris & Co., and the Hammond Packing Company, in St. Joseph, went out on strike at noon today and the plants have closed down. The strikers are orderly.

Paul, Minn., July 12.—About 700 employees of Swift & Co., in St. Paul, went on a strike today.

St. Louis, Mo., July 12.—Eighteen hundred butchers and cutters, members of Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butchers' Association, stopped work today.

HOW WE SAVED THE ARMENIANS

President Roosevelt and Hay Preparing Material for Republican "Spellbinders"

Washington, July 12. — Powerful political influence is being exerted by American missionary societies in support of the cable to the state department ten days ago by the Armenian bishop in Persia, in which this country was asked to interfere to prevent the further massacre of Armenians by Turkish barbarians, and the President and Secretary Hay have yielded to it. Mr. Hay has already acted and further steps are contemplated.

The facts are carefully guarded at the state department, for it has been intended, when the case was complete and the time opportune, to make political capital out of the incident. It has been planned that at the proper time and place some of the members in a political speech, shall tell the whole story for the first time of how the United States stepped in and put a stop to the butchery of the Armenians." New York City was selected as the place, and late in September or early in October, the time. The President is expected to deliver the address, and he is willing to discuss the treaty votes of all the Armenians and their active sympathizers in New York and London, the enthusiasm of the missionary societies throughout the country.

Mr. Hay is not dealing directly with Turkey in his manipulations of diplomacy, and he expects to accomplish the desired end without going that far. By the treaty which closed the Russo-Turkish war the signatory powers, which include England, France, Germany, Austria and Italy, virtually guaranteed the sections of the treaty which protect the rights of native and foreign Christians in Turkey. Mr. Hay has called on at least two of the powers—England and France—to carry out their guarantee through embassies and representations to the Porte, in making this request Mr. Hay put the United States under obligations to both powers, for he told them that if they were desired to make such representations an evidence of their good faith and Christian act, but a favor to this country. This favor will some day have to be repaid.

England already has complied with the request, which was submitted through Ambassador Choate, and which always moves slowly, is expected to make similar representations in a few days.

A French protest has stopped the butchery of the Armenians at least temporarily. If any further pressure is needed Mr. Hay will go to work on the President and Italy. In figure, Mr. Hay decided that they could accomplish all that the missionary societies want without showing their own hand until it was time to use the incident for campaign purposes. They did not believe it would be necessary to go further and make direct representations to the Sultan.

The state department has no confirmation of the press reports from Constantinople that the Sultan has acceded to the demands presented to him by Minister Leishman. State department officials feel that with a powerful fleet awaiting orders to be sent to Turkey to enforce the mandate, Mr. Leishman has a great opportunity to bring about a "diplomatic victory." If he fails to bring the Sultan to terms the fleet will be sent to back him up.
