Toronto, May 23.—Of the seven races on the card at the Woodbine today, four were won by favorites and the others by odds against whom the odds were laid. The track was fast, the field of good size and the racing was excellent. The finish in the third race was the hair-raising description, Plantagenet winning out from the Bugaboo, favorite at 1 to 2, ran with the money and the Bugaboo fanciers in the ring certain that he had won, and there was a howl when Plantagenet's number was posted.

In the first race, Big Mac, heavily played at 1 to 2, ran with the money and the stretch was reached, when with an effort he drew up and won by a neck from Elba.
