ed further, only to find him completely unconscious.

Medical assistance was called at once, but, despite all that could be done, he died at 12:15 without regaining consciousness.

No Bottle Found.

Not bottle or vessel of any kind was found near the lounge or in the room, to indicate the presence of poison. But it is the opinion of the doctor that this was undoubtedly the cause of the constable's death.

Constable Guthrie had been a member of the Toronto force for a number of years. He came to the city, after serving on the London force for four years, joining the local force Dec. 2, 1885. He served as a constable for some years, having gained the grade of first-class. It is only recently that he had been driving the patrol wagon.

Tuesday night Inspector Davis told Guthrie to resume regular street duty at 1 o'clock today. Guthrie did not seem hurt, and said, "Thank you." Street duty is harder on a man than ambulance work.

No Reason Known.

No reason could be given at the police station or at his home for the unfortunate man's act, if such it proves to have been. He was considered as a very good man by the department, and was commended.

He is said, however, to have been drinking rather heavily during the last year, and was reduced, from a first-class officer to the third-class grade last spring.

Died of Strychnine.

Dr. Reynolds, who was called, stated at 2 o'clock today that the constable Guthrie died of strychnine poisoning. When he reached the house the man was already dead.

He leaves a family consisting of a wife and two small children. The former is heart-broken over the affair.
