LITERARY NOTES

The August number of Scribner's
Magazine has for more than twenty
years been a fiction number. This
year, in addition to an unpublished
comedy by the late George Meredith,
and Theodore Roosevelt's article on his
experiences in Uganda, it will contain
fiction by Maurice Hewlett, Richard
Harding Davis, E. W. Hornung, Dor-
othy Canfield, Gerald Chittenden, John
R. Spears, Alice Brown, and an article
about the scene of one of his novels
by John Fox, Jun. Col. Roosevelt is one
of the few white men who have ever
seen a Nandi lion hunt, and his de-
scription in this number is the first
complete account of one of the most
dramatic episodes in his trip. In the
same article Mr. Roosevelt describes
the journey of 160 miles through
Uganda between Victoria and Albert

that came about, how much home rule
Ireland would have. Protestantism
had made this country what it was. It
gave us civil and religious liberty. This
was particularly recognized in Scot-
land. He regretted that the Prime
Minister had not left this question
alone, and allowed it to settle itself.
(Laughter.) He had always been on
good terms with Roman Catholics. He
had lived with them, and had not come
to any harm (laughter), but he would
consider it his duty to vote against
the bill on all occasions.

Sir Joseph Compton Rickett (L., Os-
goldcross), was glad the Government
were doing justice to Catholics.

Mr. J. O'Grady (Lab., East Leeds),
thought there was an anti-Catholic
feeling in the country, and that no one
took notice of the declaration except
those to whom it was offensive. To
Roman Catholics not only was it of-
fensive, but it was insulting.

Mr. J. E. Ellis (L., Rushcliffe), re-
garded the bill as a simple act of jus-
tice.

Mr. Verney (L., North Bucks), be-
lieved that Protestantism had enor-
mously increased in strength in this
country in the last two centuries. It
could perfectly safely accept the bill
of the Government.

Against 42

Majority 341
The result was received with loud
cheers on both sides of the House. The
bill was then brought in and read a
first time amid general cheers.

WHO WAS RESPONSIBLE FOR "TRICKY PAPERS"

Education Department Refuses
to Disclose Names of Those
Who Prepared the
Papers.

Toronto, July 18.—The Toronto Star
says: "The president conditions gov-
erning the entrance examinations in
Ontario are all wrong," said a local
public school principal this morning,
and the sooner the public go to the
education department and demand that
the existing evils be remedied, the
better it will be for Toronto and the
province at large.

"We public school teachers have ap-
preciated the need of a number of re-
forms for some time," he added. "And
we have crystallized our wishes in the
resolutions passed at our annual con-
ventions. But the Government has ig-
nored, or, at least, disregarded most
of our recommendations. We have
done all that we can, with little or no
result. It now rests with the people
themselves to see that the Government
attempts to do the necessary improve-
ments."

Examiners' Names Withheld.
One of the great objections of the
teachers is based on the fact that the
names of the three gentlemen whom
the Government appointed to set the
papers is a closely-guarded secret. It
is only right, they argue, that the
identity of those who are responsible
for the setting of the questions in the
various subjects should be known. This
year there is no doubt that at least two
of the papers—arithmetic and geo-
graphy—were very difficult and tricky.

Complaints are going up from nearly

MUCH-WANTED CRIPPEN IS STILL AT LARGE

Scotland Yard Believes He Is in
Europe, But Has No Clue
to Whereabouts.

London, July 18.—The London police
have fixed the date of the tragedy at
the Crippen house in Hilldrop Crescent
as the night of Jan. 31, or the early
morning hours of Feb. 1. The Crip-
pens, it is now said, entertained a few
friends on the evening of Jan. 31, and
they left before midnight. The follow-
ing date, the vaudeville artists' guild,
of which Mrs. Crippen, or Belle El-
more, as she was known on the stage,
was the treasurer, received a letter
signed Belle Elmore, explaining that
the writer had gone to America on
business. The mis-spelling of the
name, it is now remembered, caused
comment at the time.

The Scotland Yard authorities chag-
rined at having permitted Dr. Crippen
to escape, are keeping very quiet on
the result of their findings. They
realize that it will be no easy task to
prove that the dismembered body
buried in the cellar of the Hill-
drop residence is that of Belle El-
more. The inquest will be held Mon-
day.

MOTOR SOMERSAULTS

Ottawa, July 17.—In the final heat
of a five-mile automobile race on Sat-
urday at Rockliffe, Percy Harris and
Fred Morrison had a miraculous es-
cape. Mr. Harris in his 60-75 horse-
power Oldsmobile, got away to a bad
start, his competitor, F. Dunning, in
an Earl McCuaig car, obtaining a half-
mile lead. Mr. Harris let out his big
machine to almost full speed, and
rapidly overhauled the fleeing car. Just
as he was about to pass, the wheels
on the McCuaig car skidded on the
turn, and to avoid running it down,
Mr. Harris turned his machine to the
side of the track. With terrific force
it crashed into the embankment, turn-
ing over twice and throwing its occu-
pants some distance. Morrison went up
in the air over fifteen feet, alighting
on his back, and but for a badly-
bruised face and a shaking-up was
unhurt. Mr. Harris remained with
the car and hardly received a scratch.

One of the Sunday newspapers re-
ports that a man was detained at Bir-
mingham last night in connection with
the Crippen case, but this has not
been confirmed. Another paper pub-
lishes the facsimile of the envelope of
a registered letter posted to Crippen
from Croydon, a short distance from
London, on the night of July 14. The
paper says that the letter was delivered
at Crippen's office in Craven House,
and that the contents were with-
drawn. The envelope, partially de-
stroyed, was subsequently found some
miles distant, at a spot in London
hitherto unaccounted for. It is
proven that either Crippen is still in
London, or a confederate is receiving
letters in his behalf.
