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BIG STRIKE IN PORTUGAL
Many Railways and Commercial House Employees Walk Out.

Lisbon, Portugal, Jan. 11.—A majority of the railroad employees in Portugal struck today.
The Government had long been warned of the movement, and took active measures to maintain the service, with partial success.
The strikers have promised to continue international communications, and this is a hopeful feature of an otherwise gloomy situation. Following the example of the railwaymen, the employees of the commercial houses quit work on the ground that the Government had failed to issue a decree fixing the shift of a day's work at twelve hours, and providing one day of rest out of seven. As a consequence of this action, many business places in this city are closed, and the strikers are making an attempt to extend the movement to the provinces.
The managers of the railroads offered concessions early in the day, but the men declared that they were not sufficient. Crowds filled the streets this afternoon, but no disorders were reported.

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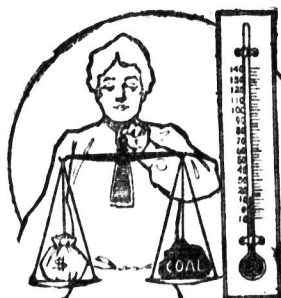

VARSITY AT ODDS WITH THE DOCTORS

Former Would Have Council
Examinations Unnecessary
For Its Graduates.

Toronto, Jan. 11.—Sir James Whitney received a deputation today that he did not expect. Dr. E. P. Hardy, president of the Ontario Medical Council; Dr. Bray, the registrar, and other representatives of the council, were called to the University buildings this morning in answer to what they understood was a summons to the Premier's office. Sir James later explained that they had been called there for nearly a month yet, and so told them to call again.
Their visit was in connection with the proposed revision of the Ontario medical act, which was introduced by Sir James. He has communicated with Queen's University, Kingston, and Western University, London, each of which has medical schools, asking the head of these institutions to give their views on the proposed changes. Having heard these he then wants to hear from the medical council.
The medical faculty of Toronto University and the Ontario Medical Council have not been pulling together very well. Men of the university medical school claim that the medical council is antagonistic and blocks the progress of the university. It is alleged that the curriculum prescribed by the council is not advanced, and thus hampers the university in compelling the latter to follow it.
This is so particularly in the scientific subjects. They are not given sufficient recognition in the curriculum of the medical council, and it is alleged that the reason is that the council have not men at their disposal who are sufficiently qualified to act as examiners at the examinations of the council on these subjects.
Toronto University is reported to have requested the Government to authorize it to allow its students to practice when they receive their medical degree. This would be ignoring the medical council, which allows no medical man to practice in Ontario, no matter what degrees he holds, till he passes the examinations of the council and receives its license.

The Question of Parke Flats Up
Again—Commissioner Advised City to Pay the Price Asked.

The water commissioners will move out of the city hall at a very early date. At the meeting of the board yesterday it was decided to rent the store owned by Mr. William Wyatt on Richmond street, next to Stevely's, at \$75 a month for three years. A vault will be put in, and other alterations made to properly fix the place up. The commissioners Chapin and Marr will make the arrangements, and complete the bargain. It is expected that the building will be occupied Feb. 1. E. Leonard & Sons offered \$12 a ton for the Kiley pumps at Springbank. This is scrap iron prices, and it was decided to allow \$10 a ton to dispose of the pumps at an early date.

The work of installing the new machinery at Springbank is being prosecuted with alacrity, and is being rushed to completion.
There were several complaints regarding overcharging, and Mr. Van referred to Manager Park for investigation.
Manager Park recommended that a hydrant be placed near the Ordnance Corps Building at a cost of \$50. The recommendation was accepted.
Messrs. F. G. Jewell and A. Screaton were named auditors for the year. Mr. H. Screaton, who has acted as auditor for some years, wrote saying that he could not accept the position this year, owing to ill-health, and Mr. A. Screaton was named to succeed him.

"It will certainly make it easy for

the customers, and will relieve the congestion at the main office here," declared Secretary Ellwood.

"Some time ago I took it up with Mr. Pringle, and he promised to give it his careful consideration," Chairman Pocock stated. "He has acceded to our request, and I think the scheme will work out to our great advantage. The Merchants' Bank is opening a branch in South London, and I would like authority to take the matter up with the manager, to see if that bank cannot collect the rates for that section. It would be a great convenience if they could arrange it for us."

"Arrange it by all means," declared Commissioner Stevenson. "That is proper business. I move that Chairman Pocock be given authority to finish this work."

The motion carried unanimously.
