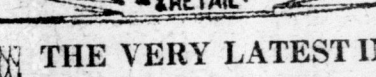

PETER FAIRBURN WILL HAVE A NEW TRIAL

Man Sentenced for Burglary Still Maintains He Is Innocent.

A Kingston dispatch states that Peter Fairburn, who was sent down from this city by Judge Macbeth to serve a three-year term for having assisted John Murray, alias Murphy, in the burglary of the Arva Roller Mills, has been assured that he will obtain a new trial within a short time. The matter was taken before the court of appeals, by Mr. P. H. Bartlett, of this city, who defended the men.

Murray, so the Kingston story states, now admits his part in the crime, but it is said that he is willing to take the stand to swear that Fairburn was not with him when he blew the safe in the Arva mill.

Fairburn stoutly maintained that he was innocent, and that he did not meet Murray until shortly before they were arrested in the bar of the King Edward Hotel. Both were intoxicated and attention was attracted to them when Fairburn attempted to extract a roll of bills from Murray's pocket. The latter appeared to be merely a farm hand, and the first idea of the authorities was to afford him protection until he revived from the intoxication.

However, it was learned upon his arrest that the money in his possession tallied almost exactly with the amount taken from the mill office.

BOYS ON LONG WALK PASS THROUGH LONDON

Two Lads Claim They Are Out to Win a Big Wager.

The Hamilton Herald says: Looking none the worse for their long grind, Frank Rae and Ernest Clark, two San Francisco boys, visited the Herald office Saturday morning after completing a trip of 3,500 miles across the continent on a journey around the world, the success of which will mean \$2,000 to each of them. The boys were brought to the Herald office by Harry Marsh, commissioner of industries, who gave them a letter certifying that they had visited Hamilton en route.

Mr. Rae, speaking of the trip, said: "We left Prince on Nov. 20, and have biked it ever since. We visited Denver, Chicago, Indiana, and crossed into this great Canada of yours from Detroit, the same place, I believe, where the famous Canadian invasion of the war of 1812 was made. We visited London, Canada, and other cities in this section, and will leave here for Niagara Falls, Rochester and New York, where we will take a boat for Liverpool. From there we will walk to London, Peterborough, and then across the English Channel, and then to Geyser. We intend to visit the Holy Land and all the other notable Asiatic and European countries during our trip."

"Before we were we were 'dipped.' Every nickel we had in our possession was taken from us, and we have had to work our way as best we could. We are allowed to ride the bumpers if we wish, and the hospitality of some kind-hearted freight or passenger conductor, but under no condition can we part with any coin for such assistance. In each city we have to report to the mayor or some other civic official, and in our daily report we include his certificate."

The young fellows say they feel fine, and they also took the part. The trip is under the management of C. Adams, of the San Francisco Times, who had charge of all arrangements regarding the route, etc. Mr. Rae and Mr. Clark look fit to finish the journey like staked horses, and they have not been tired down to any stated time in which to make the trip.
