

German Court Holds That Expression Is Punishable By Imprisonment.

GAVE LENGTHY DECISION

Law Is Most Severe, and May Be Made Even More So.

Canadian Press.] Berlin, Dec. 11. - "The strike-breaker is the coarsest and grossest expression of contempt that can be employed against a workman," according to the Erfurt criminal court, which recently sentenced a man to one month's imprisonment for using the

The judgment caused so much adverse criticism from a part of the press that the court gave out the full text of its decision to make its view-point clear. The accused man had called at the home of a former striker who had given up the battle and returned to work. The man's wife was alone in the house. She knew what the visitor's purpose was and said to

"You have come here to call my husband a strike-breaker." "He is one," replied the visitor. For this he was brought before the court on a charge of insult, "Without a Sense of Honor."

The court, beginning its decision with the sentence quoted above, con-"The word 'strike-breaker' is used to signify that the person meant is without an understanding of the just interests of his comrades, unworthy of their respect, and without a sense of The word is therefore the worst insult that can be used against a workingman. The expression is regularly employed in this sense by strik ers, and was intended by the defendant to be an expression of the great-

est possible contempt." That the defendant did not actually employ the word, the court held, was of no consequence. He confirmed its use by the woman.

Expressing Contempt.

Strikers had plenty of opportunities to learn the dangers 'strike-breaker' during the big miners' strike in the Westphalian district last year. At that time a nursing mother with an infant a few weeks old was sent to jail for a week for crying, "Pew! Strike-breaker!" group of working miners passed her One man was imprisoned because he spat "contemptuously" some miners were passing him.

The reactionary party organs Germany have been and still are agitating for a law "to afford more complete protection to persons desirous of working," meaning strike-breakers. In view of the Erfurt and other similar judgments, the Liberals are asking whether the advocates of more stringent laws want offenders boiled in oil, drawn and quartered, or how they propose to treat them.
